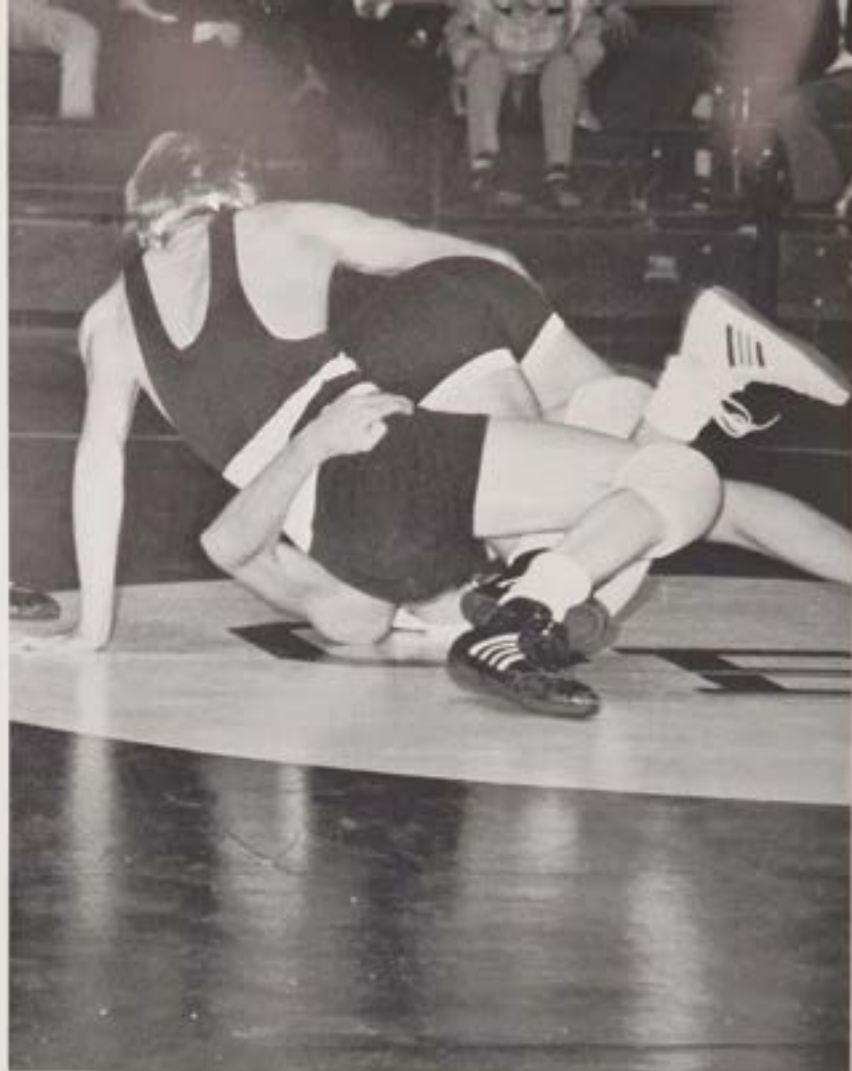
MATMEN

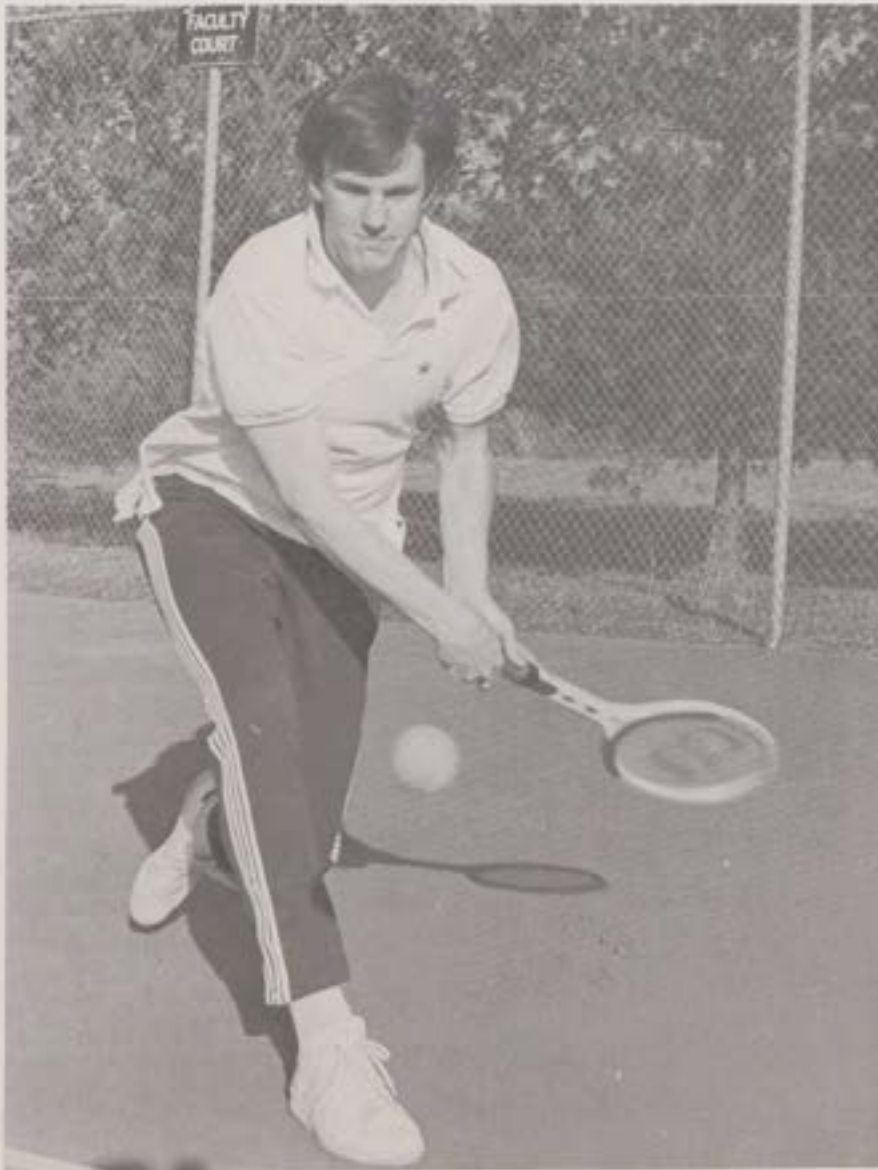

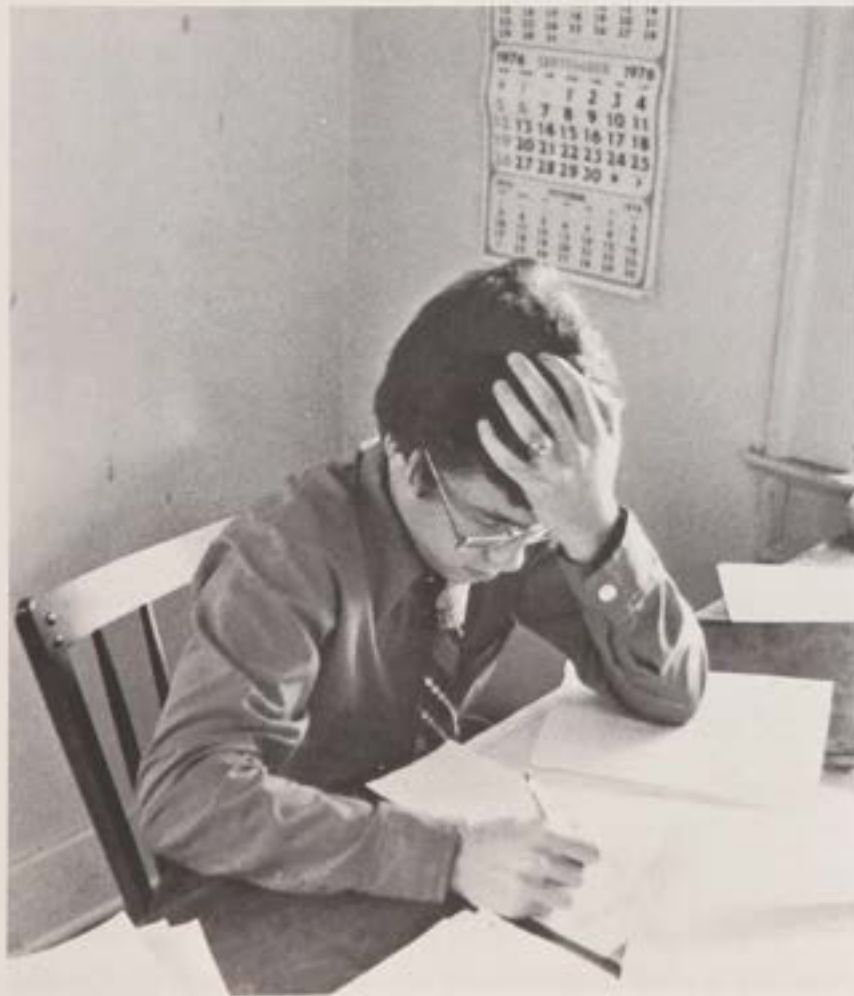

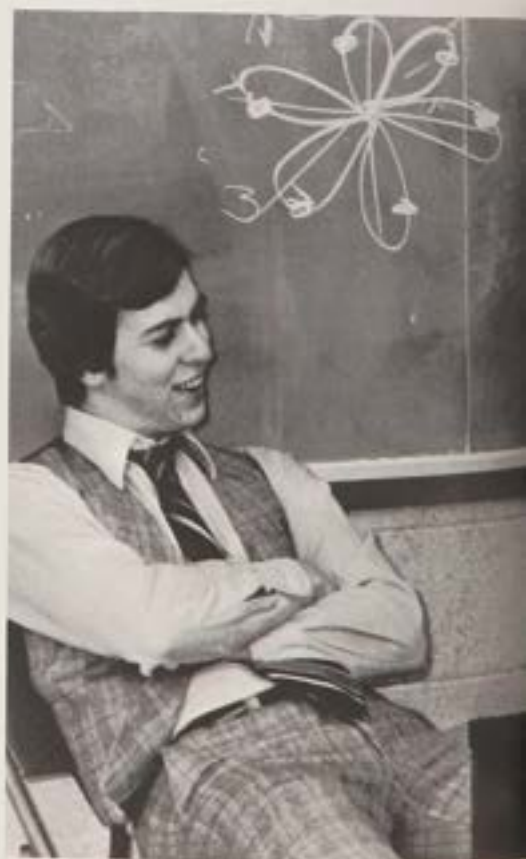

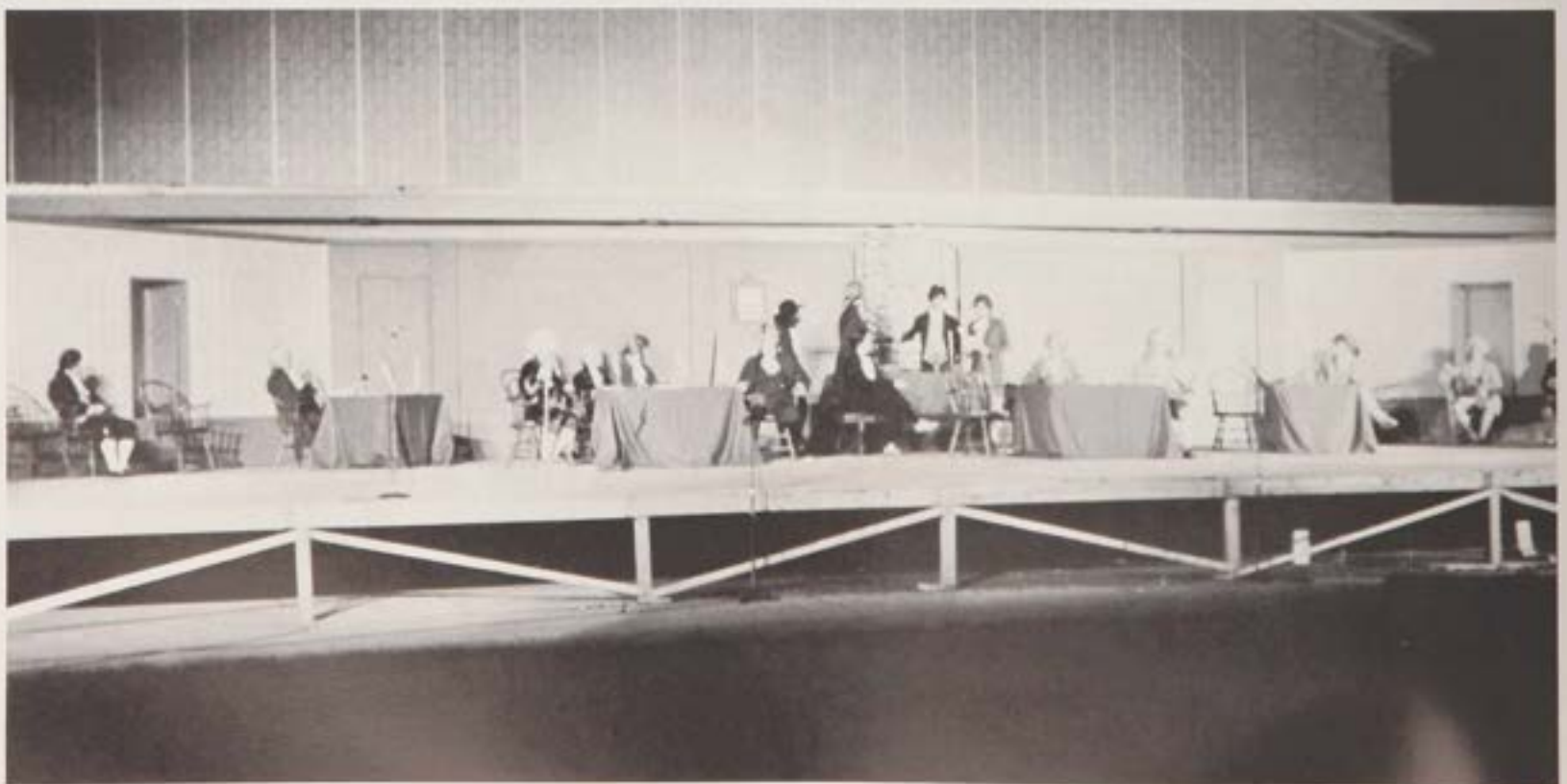

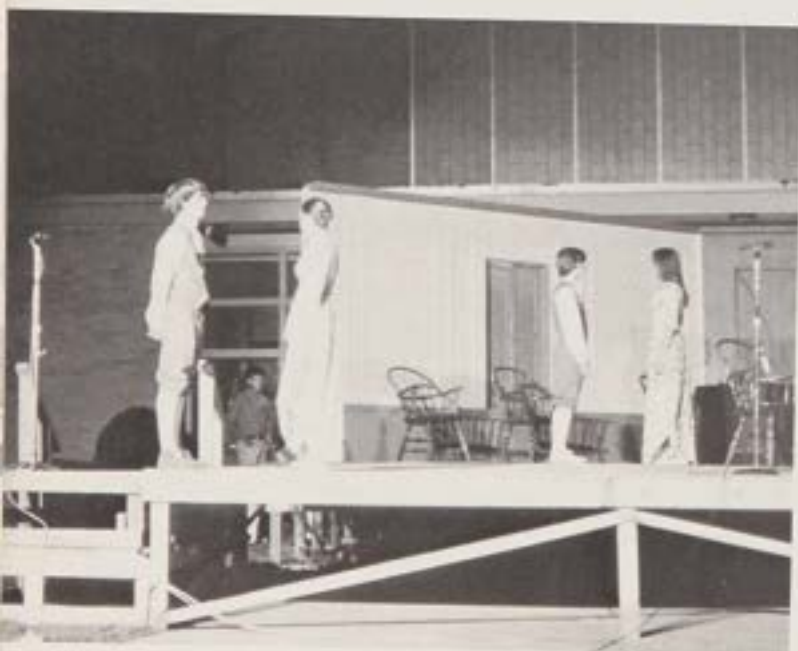

Four contests are given on the varsity and on the junior varsity levels in separate girls and boys' divisions. Between contests, the math team meets weekly to practice its skills.

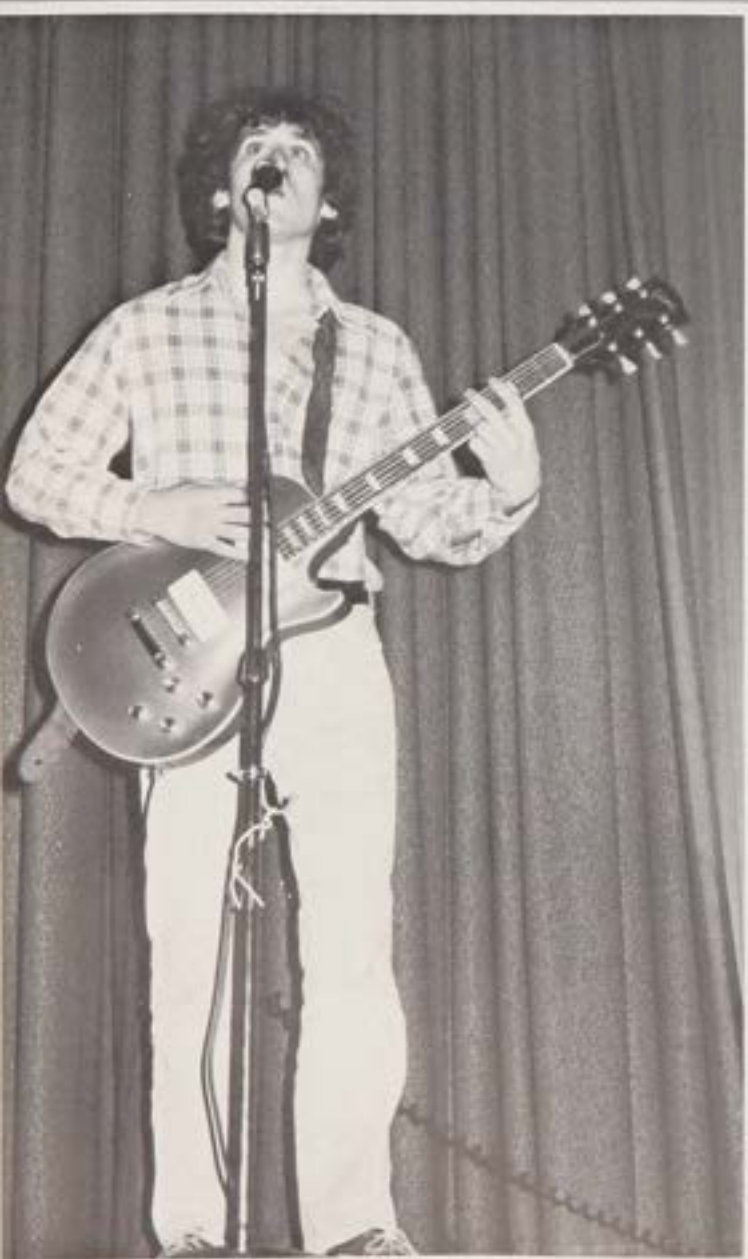

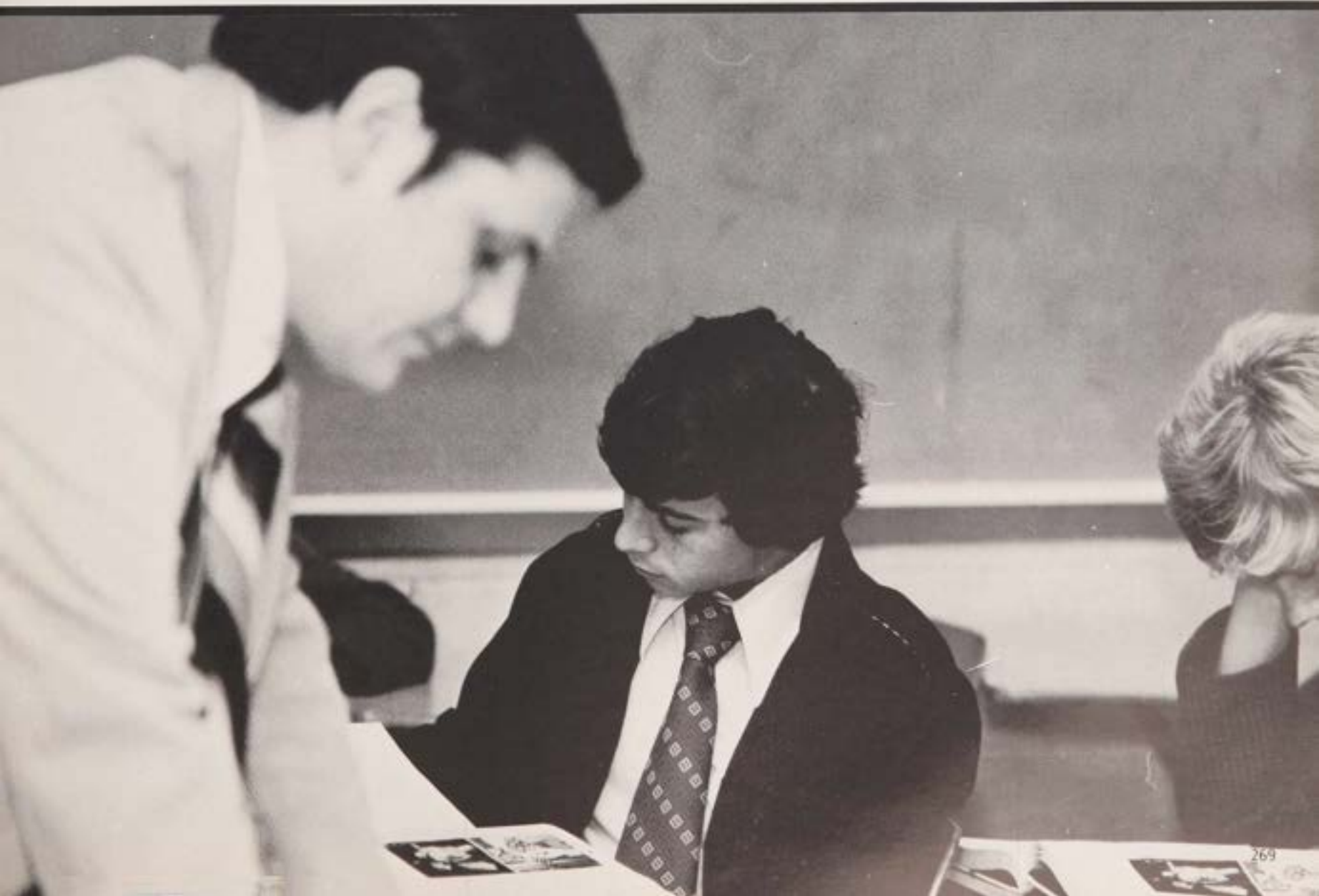
