



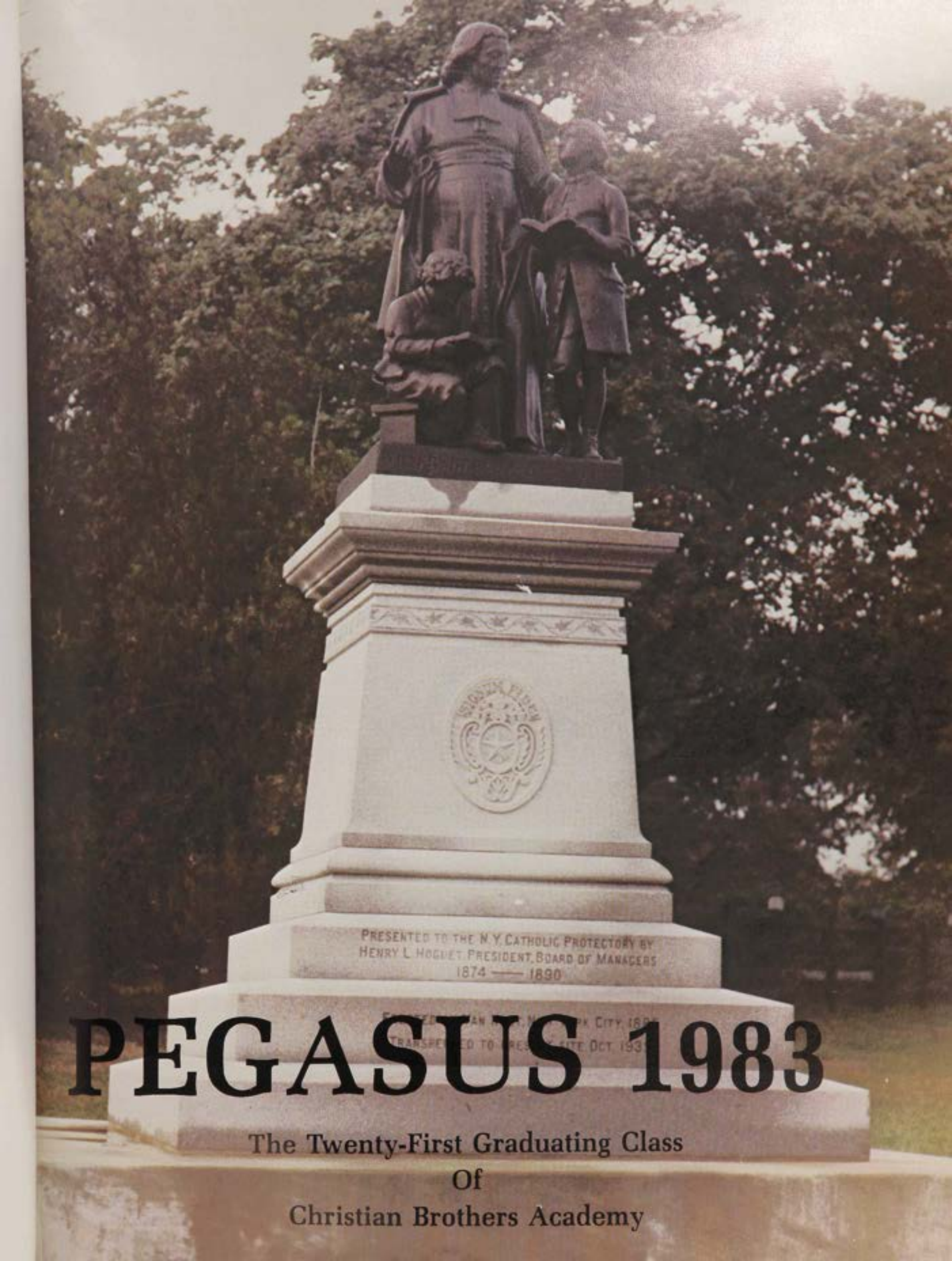

The Pegasus Editorial staff in developing the yearbook would like to present on the following pages a record of the significant events that have made the class of the 1983 so unique. Because all of us have done something for the school in some way, obviously we cannot include everyone's name. We would, however, like to give recognition to those seniors who we feel have made significant contributions to the academy.

The cross country team has always been excellent. Under the coaching of Mr. Heath, the cross country team has become a winning institution. One senior sticks out when you think about cross country and that is Paul Marabito. Paul won the Freshman run in an amazing time of 7:15.8. Paul then joined the freshman cross country team and was placed on the varsity team by sophomore year. Paul has won so many events that we do not have the space to print them although as a sophomore he broke the CBA record by running the cross country field in an amazing 14:53.0

Soccer has become one of the most popular sports at CBA. During the four years, Andy Logan has shown his expertise on the field. And has scored a total of 39 goals and 20 assists during his high school career. Bill Burke, John Fitzsimmons, John Santos, Tom Mulligan, who was elected to be co-captain along with Andy, Rob Lewis and Jim Gagliano should also be commended for their fine effort on the soccer team.

Basketball is one of CBA's most popular sports. Rob Kennedy has excelled during his four years on the basketball team. By sophomore year, he had made the varsity team. During the 1982 basketball season, Rob had made 68% of his free throw attempts. Eric Sheurer, John McDonough, Mike Dowdell, Tom Mulligan, Bill Dunn, Rich Fosko, Mike McGrath, Mike Paterno, and Ray Haigney contributed so much to the team.

The participants for indoor track have to be the most dedicated of "Heath's Harriers." Mike and Philip Horrisberger have exhibited their special talents by breaking eight freshman and sophomore school records. Mike holds the CBA record in the 50-yard dash and the 60-yard dash, the 60-yard high hurdles and the 300-meter run which is shared with



his brother, Phil, for only freshman year. Sophomore year Mike broke records in the 55-yard dash and the 55-yard high hurdles. Phil broke records in the 300 and 400-meter race. When Mr. Heath combined the talents of Mike and Phil Horrisberger with the speed of Andy Logan and Jim Sienkewicz, records were broken in the mile relay freshman and sophomore year. Special recognition should be given to Andy Logan and Kevin Spellman who broke records of their own.

Wrestling exhibits the greatest personal strength of any athlete. Robert Garwood, who wrestled 188 on the jayvee level when he was a freshman, has a record of 50 wins, 14 losses, and 3 ties. Rob has won the Long Branch Invitational when he was a freshman. During sophomore and junior years, he was wrestling on the varsity level and in the heavyweight class. He came in fourth in the districts sophomore year and second in the districts his junior year. Jim Cerwinski is another CBA great wrestler. Jim wrestled on the varsity team his freshman, sophomore and junior years at 144 and 151. Jim has a record of 53 wins and 10 losses during the first three years. He has reached the districts twice and finished first his sophomore year and third his junior year.

Outdoor track is another sport dominated by the Horrisberger brothers.



Freshman year Mike broke CBA records in the 110 high hurdles and the 400 intermediate hurdles. Phil broke the record in the 400 meter run. In his sophomore year, Mike broke three more records in the 200-meter race, 120 high hurdles, and the 400 intermediate hurdles. Phil broke the record in the two-mile run. Paul Marabito, who

was running varsity, broke the CBA record in the steeple chase. Kevin Spellman holds a record in the high jump.

Tennis has one of the greatest records in CBA's history. Marc Policastro has started on the varsity team since freshman year with a record of 75 matches won and 5 losses. Myles Gilsenan has also started for the varsity team since his freshman year and has a record of 81 matches won and 2 losses. Albert Chu and Ward Berlin have also been on the team since their freshman year.

Baseball is another popular spectator sport. One of the best players on the baseball team is Bob Johnson. He had a batting average of .438 in his junior year and made All-County first team. That year he had 31 hits, 23 runs scored and 16 stolen bases with 16 runs batted in. John Maggs is another great baseball player. John had an ERA of 2:04 his junior year and was pitching for the varsity by his sophomore year. Sean Doyle, Jim Granaghan, Tony Tracy and Rich Fosko should be acknowledged for their participation in making a great team.

At CBA, academic achievement is very important to many people. By January of their freshman year, the first five positions in class rank were tabulated. Richard Buus was first, followed by Gerry Cruz, Anthony B. Cashman III, Rob Garwood, and Scott Brandon. During the next five semesters, frequent appearances of students like R. Peter L. Cuasay, Albert Chu, Andrew Logan, Rob DiMegio and James Millonig were made in the top five. By the end of the sixth semesters, first place was still held by Richard Buus and was followed by Anthony B. Cashman III, R. Peter L. Cuasay, Albert Chu and Jim Gallagher.

As for the future, our successes will be determined by our efforts, talents and ambition. We wish the best for every single student in the senior class and that your dreams of success may come true.

Recognition

The Editorial Staff of the 1983 **Pegasus** would like to pay special tribute to Mr. Anthony Chesney, Mr. Vincent Cox, and Mr. John O'Shea for their many years of service to Christian Brothers Academy. Their dedication is evidenced both in and out of school. Besides contributing to the strong academic program they each have coached a varsity sport. Over the years their records have instituted a winning tradition at CBA.

Mr. Anthony Chesney is originally from the Jersey City area. When he came to Christian Brothers Academy in September, 1961, he immediately took an active part in the school. He coordinated the intramural football program, and was the coach of the varsity wrestling team. Under Mr. Chesney's direction, the CBA wrestlers enjoyed some of their finest seasons. Academically, Mr. Chesney has shown diversity in teaching a variety of subjects including accounting, economics, first aid, general science, and physical education. Those students that pass through CBA will never forget his wit and teaching flair.

Mr. Vincent Cox joined the staff of CBA in September, 1962. Upon entering CBA, Mr. Cox taught U.S. History, and became head coach of the CBA varsity basketball team. Within 3 years Mr. Cox led the Colts to a state championship. Many outstanding years were to follow. In 17 seasons, Mr. Cox compiled a total of five Parochial "A" State titles, and two South Jersey titles. In particular the students are thankful for the many "basketball holidays." Today, Mr. Cox still lends his basketball expertise to the teams, and coordinates the huge intramural soccer program with Mr. Lockwood. He also remains a vital teaching force in the History Dept. here at the Academy. His warmth, and friendliness will never be forgotten by the members of the CBA community.

In 1964 Mr. John O'Shea joined Mr. Chesney, and Mr. Cox on the staff at CBA. Besides teaching math, Mr.



O'Shea has also taught French classes. In 1968 he took over the reins of the varsity tennis team. Within a year he transformed a good team into a great team. As head coach for eleven years, he has accumulated eleven Parochial A State Titles, and ten Monmouth Invitational titles. His career record stands at 268 wins and 22 losses. Presently, Mr. O'Shea teaches geometry, and heads the Jersey Shore Tennis Academy at Little Silver. Now many players are able to benefit from his expertise. In particular, CBA varsity tennis candidates have benefited

from his tutelage. Mr. O'Shea's professionalism both in school and out on the courts has been a tremendous asset to CBA.

The time and energy Mr. Chesney, Mr. Cox, and Mr. O'Shea have put forth for the students at CBA has been invaluable. Their accomplishments have furthered the fine reputation CBA has nurtured. So to show our appreciation we would like to pay special tribute to Mr. Anthony Chesney, Mr. Vincent Cox, and Mr. John O'Shea.

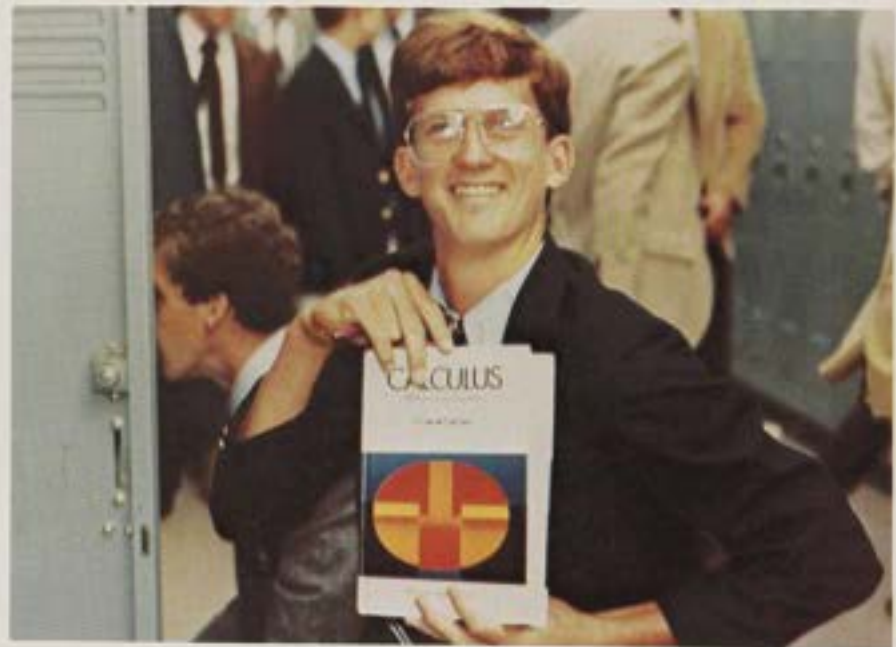

Memories

Since the purpose of a yearbook is to keep memories and spirit alive whenever we look back on them, it is our purpose this year to relate our feelings through writing and past pictures. It was once written that "There are all those early memories; one cannot get another set; one has only those." This best sums up the purpose for the existence of a yearbook, and that is why we are including two pages dedicated to the memories of our first three years.

Freshman year ushered in a new era in our lives. Since many of us did not know one another, we do not have many specific common memories. Nevertheless, the memories that we do share are priceless. The first tangible memory is the Freshman Run. We all ran the one and half mile course in order for the natural track athletes to reveal themselves. This was done so our track team could maintain its excellent status. Members of the freshman cross country team included John O'Connor, Tony Tracy, Dan Rollo, Rob Barry and Eric Sheurer.

In addition, the Freshman Field Day was instituted by the Student Council of 1980—Jim Tracy, Barry Sabin, Louis Gervolino, and Mike Smith. We all ate hamburgers, played soccer and ran the

obstacle course. Another memory from freshman year was Algebra I with Brother Bernie. Such phrases came out of the class as "number next" and "just checking if you were paying attention." Freshman year could not be properly remembered without mention of Earth Science class. During the first semester, Mr. Fonos taught us and then left to join the New York Transit Authority. Afterwards, Mr. Bojorn Johnson took over and made the class even more of a challenge.

Finally, GURU religion was introduced to our class by Mr. Boro. The design of the course was that a section of freshmen would be taught by a senior in a small group atmosphere. We would break up into small groups at least once a week and discuss such topics as group goals and decisions in order to prepare us for growth. Religion that year taught by Mr. Boro, Brother Neil and Brother Henry Owens was not easy, especially when a final exam was added to the requirements.

In the Sophomore year the fun started. In looking back, many good things happened to the sophomore class that year. The first thing that comes to mind when I think of the beginning of sophomore year is the arrival of so many new faces and the disappearance of so many familiar ones. For example, on orientation day we were introduced to the new vice principal, Brother Timothy Tarmey. Brother Tim replaced Brother Gabe who left us to go to Manhattan College. I think we all remember Brother Tim's speech to us that day. The focal point of the dissertation was his attitude toward the buses. He claimed that he was "fanatical" about how we acted on the buses. He certainly proved himself right. A few weeks later, we said goodbye to another faculty member, Mr. Pacelli, who was the academic vice principal. We held a final ceremony in his honor which every student in the school attended. We all gave him a standing ovation for his services; he was moved to tears. There was a happy note at that ceremony because we congratulated Brother Bernie on his Golden Jubilee—50 years of service as a Brother. We also gave him an enthusiastic standing ovation.

Late in our freshman year we had been notified that there was going to be mandatory sophomore study halls. The study halls were held in McKenna Hall in room 37. They were not always the place to study. For sophomore religion, most of us had Miss Tracey—a newcomer. In the class we learned about the four types of prayer and how to pray. We did this by reading *The Way of the Pilgrim* and lying on our backs

staring at the ceiling meditating. What a way to spend a class!

The two mandatory classes in sophomore year besides English were First Aid and Cultural Arts. Miss Conroy tried valiantly in a small period of time to instill us with some culture. She exposed us to Bach, Beethoven, Mozart, Gershwin, Moussorgsky, and who could forget the Peer Gynt Suite with all the trolls running all over Sweden. Then we had a test on all the compositions that we heard in class. Who could remember?! First Aid was taught by Mr. Chesney—"Hey stick, what's the answer?" We all remember that there are 206 bones, over 600 muscles, and 12 pints of blood in the human body. And how about, "Annie! Annie! Are you OK?" Look, Listen, Feel and four quick sharp breaths. We had to have that down pat or else it was push up time.

The end of sophomore year brought three significant memories. First, the Biology Achievement Test with Brother Patrick. We prepared for two months for June 3, 1981. Fortunately, most of us did well. Secondly, the speeches for the offices of the Student Council were heard. Chuck Eblon's speech ripped the 1981 Student Council apart. He amazed so many people that day that he had us wildly clapping for him. A three-minute speech to remember! Third, and finally, the Hand in Hand Festival was instituted that year at CBA. A bus full of sophomores went to Middlesex County Community College and devoted a day to walk, literally hand in hand, with a handicapped person. A day I will never forget.

The Hunt ushered in our junior year at the Academy. One Saturday in the middle of fall when all the trees were losing their leaves, we all met on a hill in Holmdel to watch horses jump over fences! This auspicious occasion proved to be just the first of many meaningful memories of a terrific year. During our first week in school we were introduced to our new religion teacher, Mr. Bernie Krzan, who was more fondly referred to as a Saturday morning super hero. In religion we learned about different church doctrine interpretations, Erickson's theory on morality and the basic ten points in making a decision. Mr. Krzan's class offered a definite pleasing change of pace in our otherwise hectic schedules.

Most of us in junior year either had "Doc" Flanagan or Mr. Hugh McKenna for English. For those of us who had "Doc", it was the year of toxic waste. We heard about toxic waste in Marlboro, toxic waste in Atlantic County, "Midnight Dumping," the biological effects of toxic waste and the sludge produced by dumping toxic waste in the ocean. If any of us had to hear about toxic waste ever again, I think we would turn into mutant beings by ourselves. To prepare for the term paper, Doc had us research such topics as the number and names of ferry services between Jersey City and New York City in 1907, or the starting line-up for the minor league Newark baseball team in 1937. Mr. McKenna kept his students as busy, but in a different way. A typical homework assignment went something like this: Read pages 482-507 in the Norton Anthology for tomorrow with a possibility of a quiz, a vocabulary quiz tomorrow, a paper on *Alice in Wonderland*, due in three days and a grammar test the next day. Last year, there was never a student of Mr. McKenna's without a frantic look on his face.

By the beginning of junior year, most of us had been taught by Brother Christian Jones. He taught us the principles of the limit— "as the limit approaches one it is not exactly one but as close to the limit as you can get, like 99999999999 and the fundamentals of the 'a-a-a-angnt' line." Brother usually gave us four tests a marking period, which everyone dedicatedly prepared for in one way or the other! Brother Christian cannot be properly remembered without mention of his coaching abilities with the math team. Brother coaches both the varsity and the junior varsity squads, and leads them to victory in the Shore, State and Catholic League Conferences. Fine work, Brother!

All of us had to take two years of a modern language, but for those who took an extra year, it was an unusual experience. Mrs. Decker believed that her students should learn of the Spanish culture first hand. Therefore, she took her class to an authentic Spanish restaurant. The meal was authentic alright, but the quality was not actually up to the health department standards. Mrs. Callan taught French III, which consisted of oral presentations by the students, tapes to measure oral skills, and filmstrips about different aspects of the French culture. During the year, we read two french books. One, *Sports Actifs*, was about French men and women who compete in various sport activities. It never failed in each short story that the competitor would fail to reach his goal because he was not good enough, his car crashed, or his boat sank. C'est la vie! The second book

was *Gargantua*, not the gigantic monster who destroys Tokyo in three minutes, but a French baby with a thyroid problem. A sure fire French classic if there ever was one.

History II was also an interesting experience. Mr. Vinny Cox guided his classes through the intricacies of the depression, the complexities of the New Deal and "LITERALLY" to the present, ITSELF.

For those of us who were taught by Mr. James Finnigan in A.P. History, we learned a great deal. We covered the span of American History from the exploration to the New Deal. We also learned to despise Richard Hofstadter!

The year culminated with two events. At the RBC gym in March the Colts took on the Caseys in a game of basketball. The Casey fans and the Colt fans became so incited with team spirit that they disrupted the game. Nevertheless, the Colts won two over the Caseys. Secondly, the CBA junior prom marked the end of our junior year and the beginning of our senior year. We all had a great time at **Jumping Brook Country Club** in Neptune, thanks to the organization of Bob Stefanski and John O'Connor and the music of **Louster Reach**.

Finally, we cannot write about the memories of 1983 because they are still in the process of happening. Fortunately, I know that I will not have to preserve our senior memories with ink and pictures because these memories will live the longest and the freshest in our minds and in our hearts. I hope that everyone has the best time of their lives, because we only go around once. Best of luck!

Focus: Dress Code

Christian Brothers Academy has many student regulations. The administration has set standards for the student body to adhere to. Such policies as mandatory study halls, required religion classes, and the dress code are a part of the Academy. Over the years, the benefits of a dress code in an educational institution have been debated, both pro and con. Although critics claim that the required dress is uncomfortable, the administration feels it is a positive policy and that it should remain an integral part of campus life.

Our new dean of Academics, Mr. Santanello, has made an increased

Focus: Computers in the Future

Interest in computer science at C.B.A. is rapidly transforming computer class from an elective into a major field of study. With the popularity of household microcomputers in today's world, it is not surprising that many students have computers at home and want to learn how to program them. Our excellent computer staff, consisting of Brother James Dobson, Mr. Lockwood, and Mr. Melosh has taught us well, and, with the advent of an Advanced Placement Computer

course on the horizon, they will continue to do so.

Our computer room is equipped with 20 TRS-80 Model III microcomputers, five with dual disc drives, and one Model I. Juniors and Seniors can take computer courses and can choose among BASIC, Pascal, and BASIC II as languages. Computer classes meet twice a week, once for classroom instruction and once for lab. The lab is open all day for all students and faculty to work on programs of their own.

The future of computers at C.B.A. looks very bright. In the years to come, the course will

be expanded into a three-year sequence of languages culminating in A.P. Pascal in Senior Year. We will have a special branch of computer science called Computer Assisted Education with disks and tapes to help students on academic topics. We will add more computers and eventually link the lab up to other larger main computers. As it is now, C.B.A. has the most comprehensive computer program of high schools in the area and we look forward to expansion and increased interest in computer programming.

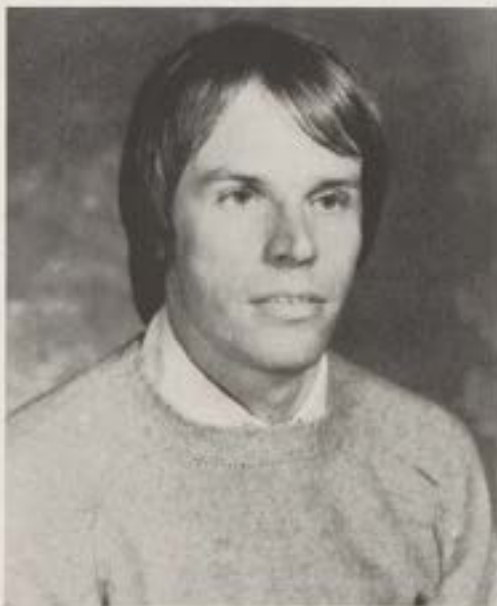

Focus: Missions

Not all the brothers at CBA are just teachers. Brother Micheal Kennedy, a sophomore guidance counselor, is also responsible for mission work done here. He has organized a school mission club. This club is designed to make students more aware as to the workings of the missions in under-privileged countries. The present chairman of the club is Craig Kievat.

Every (Catholic Christian Brothers) school is required to take a twin school. These twin schools are located in poverty stricken parts of the world like Ethiopia, Tanzania, Kenya, and Guatamala. CBA is twinned with the Dira-Dawa

school in Ethiopia. The school has elementary grades 1 through 8, for children. In addition, it offers adult education at night. The school is under the direction of Brother Maile, its principal. Ethiopian Brothers teach at the school as well as lay teachers.

Here at home, CBA was able to raise over \$1000 for the mission. In December, held a dress down day, and each participant contributed a dollar. During Lent, another fund raiser was held. A globe bank was placed in each homeroom as a reminder for donations. All this money was sent to Ethiopia for supplies for the students and repairs on the schools. Among the repairs included a water well which is

essential since the school is situated on the side of a desert.

Brother Micheal Kennedy is trying to make students realize the importance of praying for the work of the missions. Having lived and seen the conditions of Dira-Dawa, Brother well understands the plight of Ethiopia and other underdeveloped countries. In particular, the school needs help since the communist regime is taking control of the country. Brother Micheal hopes that through continued support not only will Dira-Dawa benefit but the CBA community will greatly grow in faith.

Focus: A.P. Calculus II

Among the various departments at CBA, the mathematics department is perhaps the strongest. Turning out quality math students, CBA has established itself as a math power evidenced by the strong annual performances of the math team and the scores achieved on the College Board Examinations. The success of the math department is largely due to the accelerated program which culminates in the study of Calculus. But unlike other schools, CBA offers a second year of Calculus.

A.P. Calculus II is taught by Mr. Peter Santanello, the academic dean. In summary, the course reviews concepts taught in Calculus I, and progresses into new topics in preparation for the BC Advance Placement Exam. Depending upon the student's score and his choice of college, it is possible to attain up to 8 credits. Whether or not students accept the credit is purely up to them. Although most students will agree that Calculus II is quite difficult, they will also concede that it is worth the effort.



Though the advantages of Calculus II are numerous, there are many students who are fearful of the course. It is no secret that Calculus II is "challenging". This year only eleven students ventured to take the course. More, however, are qualified to take a second year of Calculus. Offered at few other high schools, Calculus II is a rare opportunity to take a high level math course while still in high school.

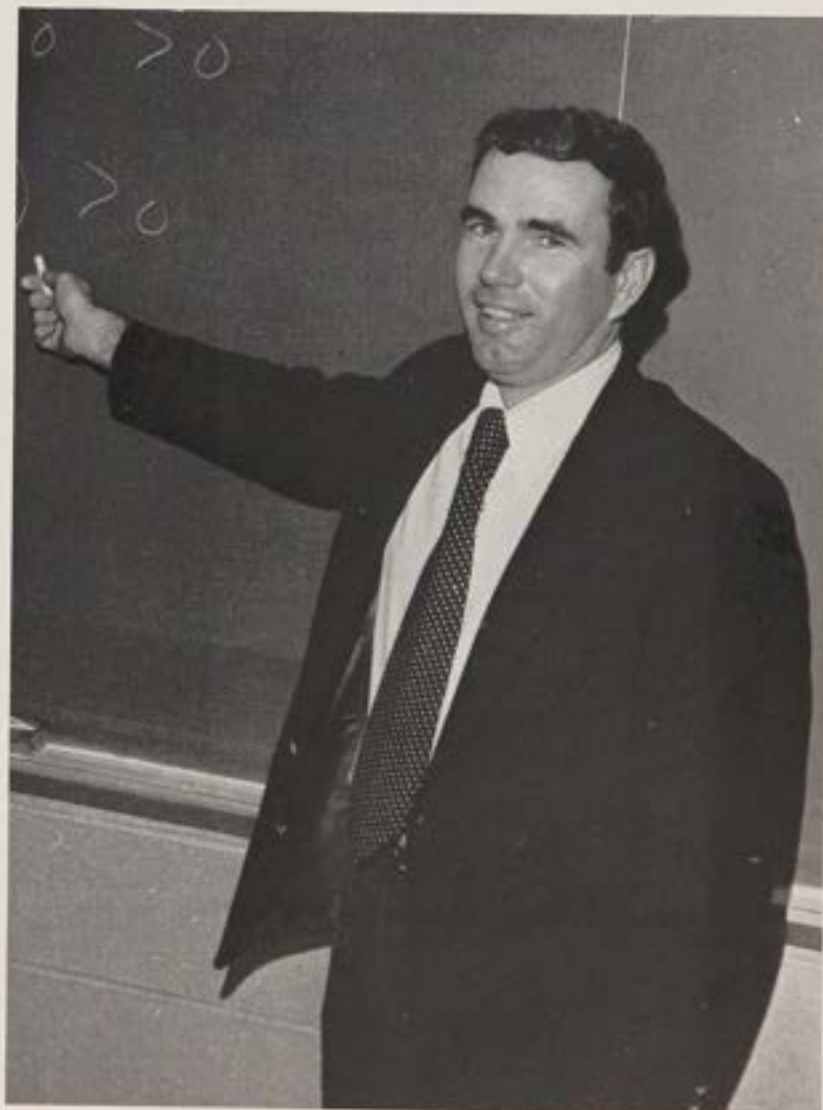

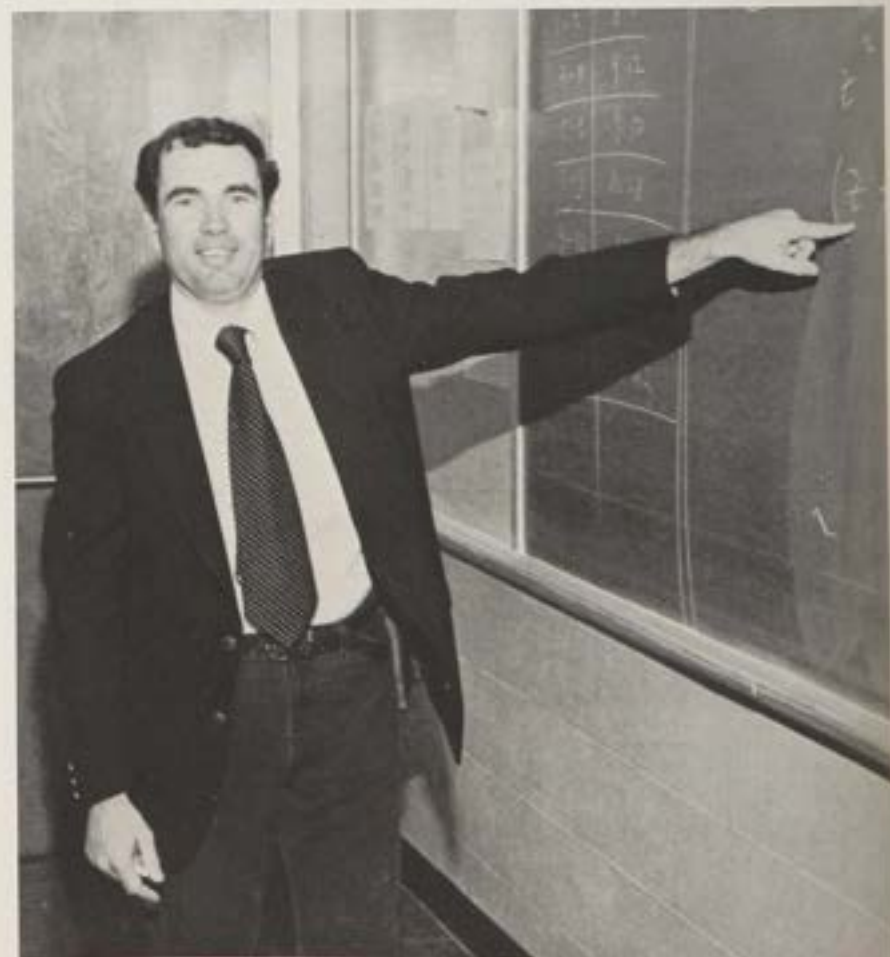

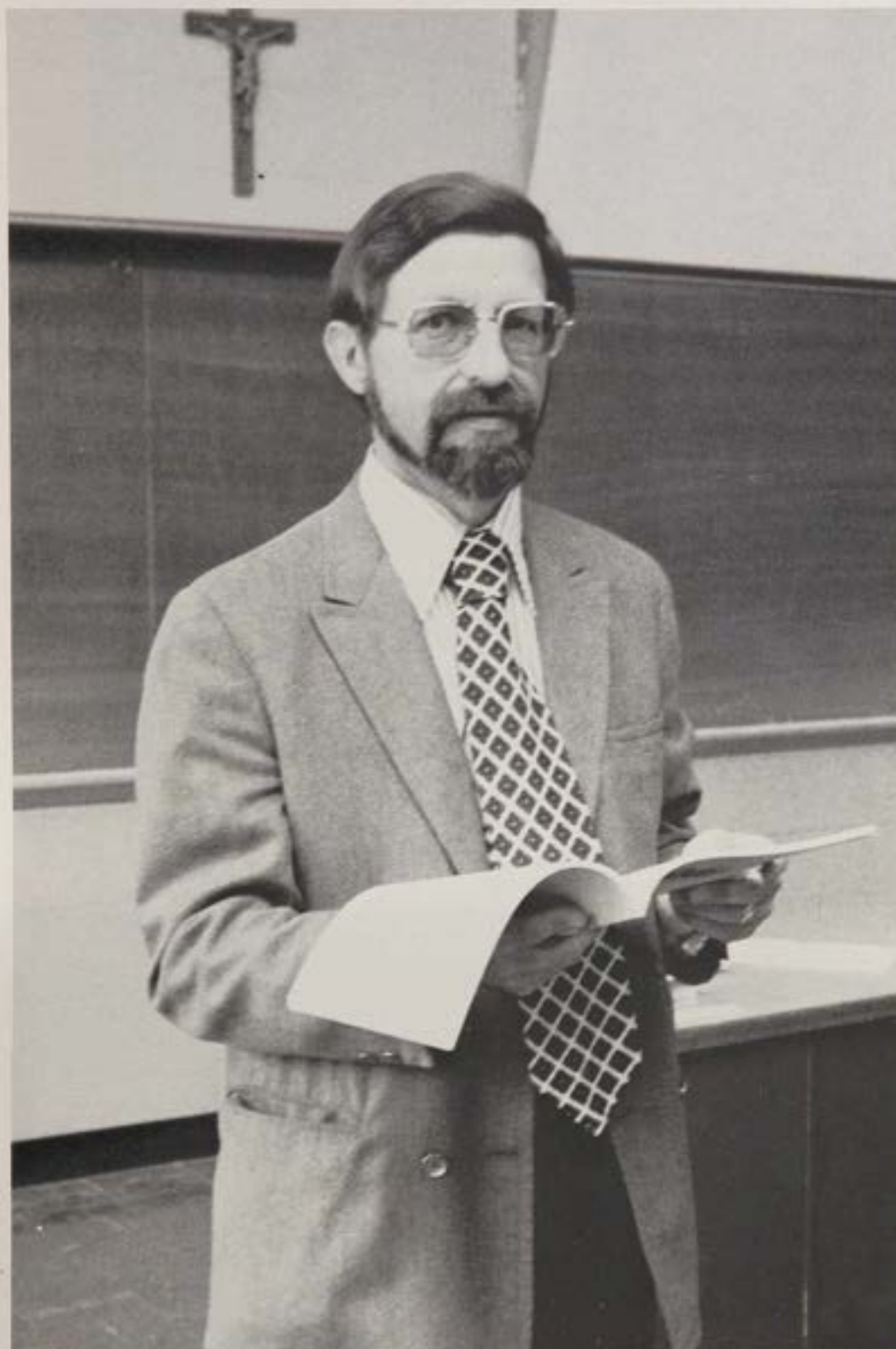

Focus: Alternative Religion Classes

Religion is one of the required courses at CBA. In order to graduate, a student must take four years of religion. During the first three years, the religion classes are taught in the usual classroom atmosphere. However, in senior year there are two alternatives. They are the GURU Program initiated by Mr. Boro in 1980 and the Christian

Service course developed by Miss Tracy last year. In the GURU class, seniors are selected by Mr. Boro to teach small groups of Freshmen their religion course. Christian Service allows seniors to get out of the classroom and to apply their religion by aiding people in need.

The GURU Program is a religion course offered to seniors who are interested in leading small groups of freshmen in discussion and helping them learn many aspects of human life. While teaching the freshmen

may seem to be the goal of the course, it is in fact just an added benefit. The major objective deals with the holistic growth of each "guru". The guru is expected to prepare for each group meeting, to lead it, and to give a written summary to the freshman teacher. Mr. Boro, who is creator of the program and mentor to the gurus, teaches different theories of how to live and improve life, including "Adventure in Attitudes", "Wellness", as well as his own Boronian Theories. It is through the experience with each freshman and his studies with Mr. Boro that each senior develops himself as a whole person in the sight of God.

The Christian Service option allows seniors to put into practice the Christian principles that they have studied. Students volunteer at least two hours a week throughout the school year to some supervised form of service to others. In addition to this, all students in the Christian Service program meet monthly to reflect on their experiences and reading assignments. Also, each student keeps a personal reflective journal and meets privately with Miss Tracey to evaluate his own development. Many students find themselves putting in more than the minimum amount of time in such areas as tutoring, teaching, volunteering time to hospitals, nursing homes, or first aid squads. The Christian Service program gives each student a unique opportunity for spirited growth in addition to performing a worthwhile service; students serve to learn as much as they learn to serve.

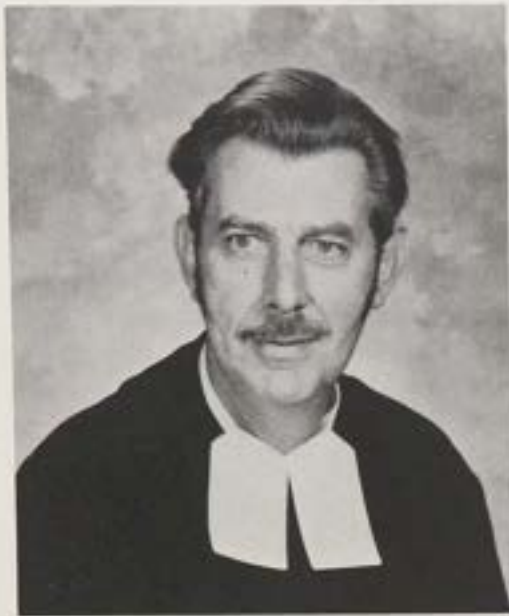

Focus: Biology

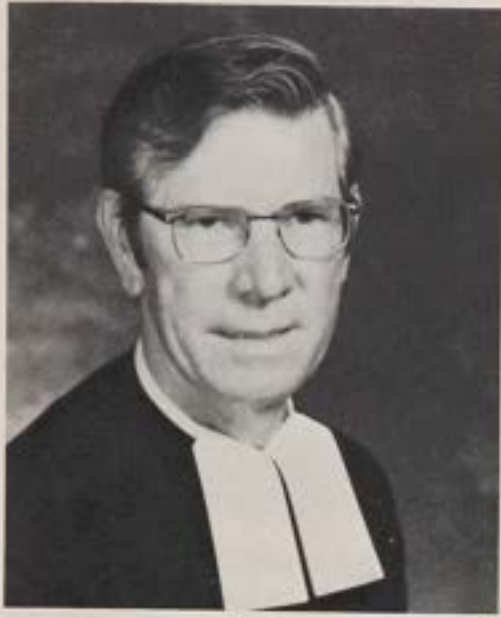
Among the sciences, biology is one of the required courses here at C.B.A. All students must take the regular biology course in their freshman or sophomore years. This course is taught by Bro. Patrick Higgins, and is designed to give the student a basic understanding of all phases of biology. In senior year, a student has the option of taking the A.P. Biology course.

A month before the school year ends, Bro. Pat begins to review. This review is designed to prepare the students for the biology achievement test taken in June. A special

handbook serves as the basis for this review. It contains basic information about all subjects of biology studied during the year. The book also has New York State Regents Tests from previous years. These are designed to familiarize the students with the types of questions found on the June exam. In this manner, the student is comfortable with all material by June and therefore is generally able to do well on the achievement test.

Advanced Placement Biology is a college-level science course offered at CBA for senior honor students. The course material is taken from a college textbook and consists of a general overview of biology, including human physiology and anatomy, genetics, and evolution. AP Biology is taught by our dedicated instructor, Miss Schroll. With the aid of CBA's excellent lab facilities, she ably conducts lab experiments and classroom lectures. Students can also go on field trips and to facilities such as hospitals. Tests are given every two weeks and consist of some objective questions and a detailed scientific essay. The class meets five days a week with one three-mod session set aside for lab time. Based on the performance of CBA students on the AP Biology exam over the past years, the students learn well and are greatly prepared for college by this class. It is a solid and integral part of the advanced placement program at CBA.

What do you think makes CBA special?

How many have a dress code, but, at the same time, such a casual, unregimented atmosphere? And finally, how many share religion and tragedy as a community? Clearly, we are unique, if not special. But there is more to this answer. A CBA education is personalized. I know I've come in contact with most of my class and have made friends with many faculty members, including secretaries, librarians, and cafeteria ladies. I think this latter fact is due to the absence of the "us and them" attitude of public schools. I also remember the words of advice espoused to us many times during freshman year: Get Involved! And I find myself reiterating the same to this year's freshmen for it's the best key to the CBA experience. Experi-

ence — I think that hits it on the nose. To paraphrase the armed forces, CBA is not just a school, it's an adventure. Academics is only one facet. Extracurricular activities are an integral part of this adventure. They're a source of friendship, school spirit, and most importantly, fun. All students, except a small percentage, get involved in some fashion, which, I believe, is better than any public school. Also, there is a definite Christian dimension to the school that separates it from all others. One just has to look at the participation in Campus Ministry, the liturgies, and the GURU program to see it. We share in each other's joys and sorrows as a community and, truly, I believe there is more genuine human respect, more kindness shown, than in any public school.

To sum it up, I believe it is these things that make CBA special: the academic, extracurricular, and Christian dimensions coupled with a relaxed, friendly, family-like atmosphere. I will admit that I did not want to come here, but, as proof of the validity of what I have said, I'm glad I didn't go anyplace else.

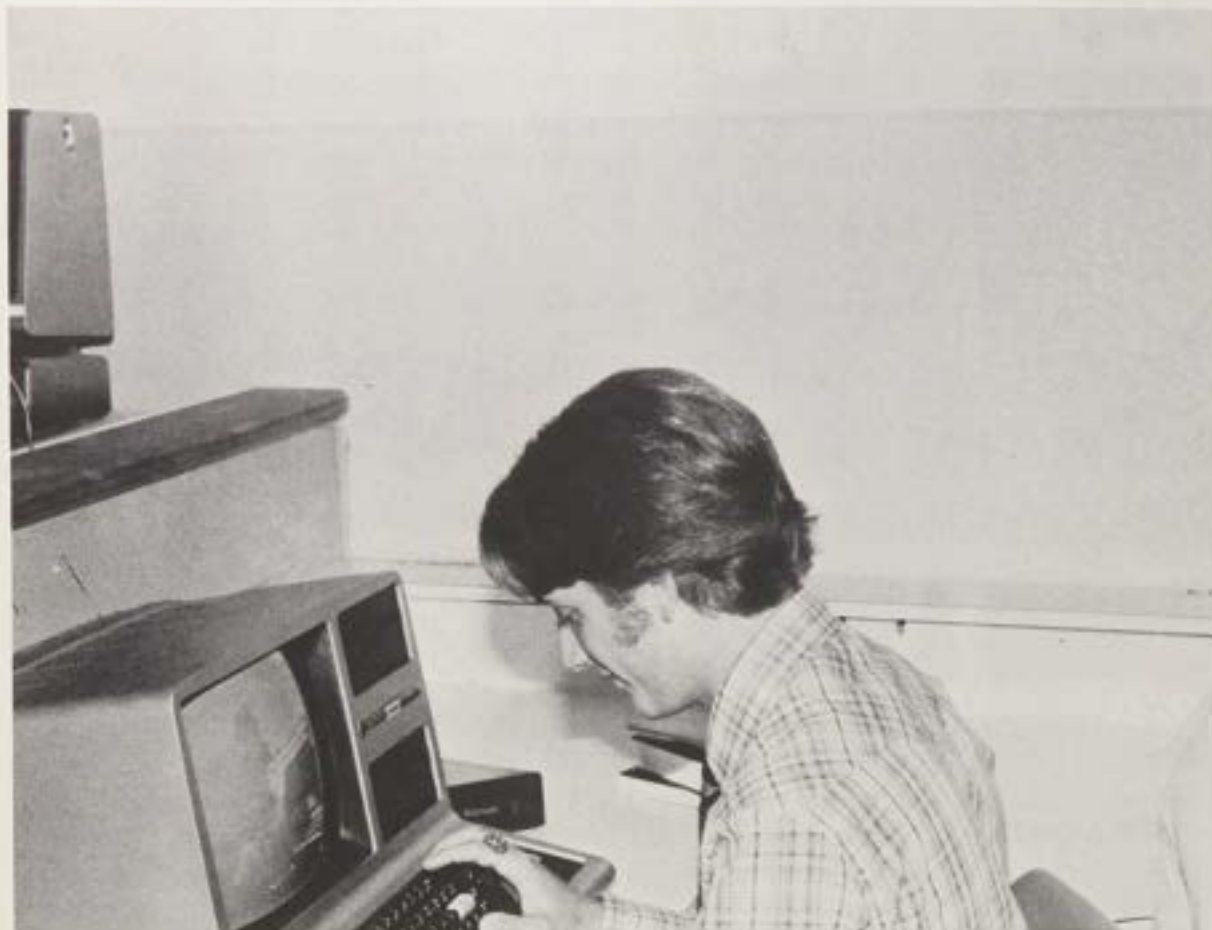

Freedom and responsibility often come joined in an uneasy alliance. Freedom we advertise as a precious and essential commodity. Responsibility is the price we must unfortunately but inevitably pay. Yet both actually breathe into existence the exhilaration of adventure. Freedom contributes all the opportunity of a first rate mythology; responsibility is a challenge that adds the risk of our personal destiny. For everyone with the measure of youth that is hope, the world today offers objects of adventure that call forth our responsibility to see, to care, and to act.

We have, first, a responsibility to our planet. It is not our planet to possess and exploit any more than our homes exist to be contaminated and burned. Yet we participate in a world where pollution of air and water takes numerous and insidious forms. Deforestation, desertification, and extinction are carried out for profit. We threaten to mire the balance of ecology in a growing swamp of water. We may forever close our minds to natural treasures that are swept into the jaws of progress. The amount of destruction justified by the term civilization is barbously appalling. It is not just humanity but nature itself that is, in Merham's words, "betrayed, plundered, profaned, and disinherited." If there is a future at all, it is to enter an adventure of long term thinking, renewable resources, moderate consumption, careful preservation, environmental harmony, and a responsible transmission to the future of the green glory still roving around the sun.

Another responsibility arises when we consider the more than 1.1 billion people living in areas where annual per capita income is less than a week's wages in developing countries like America. It is far too easy to dismiss as statistics the more than 70 million who face starvation each year, the 100 million disabled

without help, the 600 million who live at nutritional levels that retard the brain, and the 900 million who exist in a dismal category known as absolute poverty. It is easy to avoid the fact that in trading policies and relations aid, technology, and even to capital, the developed world must stand virtually convicted of criminal neglect. The Third World, where the vast majority earns less than \$500 annually, contains 70% of the earth's population but commands under 12% of the world's wealth, while its growing debt is around 400 billion dollars. But though this world remains largely invisible, it also remains emphatically human. Our suffering, our need begs in Bangladesh and languishes in India. Our salvation rests in our commitment to providing fundamental needs, to building human resources, to replacing environments of disease with landscape of health, and to shatter shackles of want that manacle the potential of humanity.

Our salvation rests in our commitment . . .

Our planet and our people, our home and our family, eye us hopefully across the chasm which our lack of commitment has dug into our dreams. These concerns must be met before greater hopes are realized. We are responsible for earth and man as the starting points for our best selves, and we are as responsible for that as much as we are free to become it. How we shoulder these responsibilities can only be answered by education, by an understanding of the entire plight confronting us. The predicament of the world is just a glaring effect while the causes and origins run deep in civilization. We shall need to ponder as well as act, it is the learning, the daring, and the fighting that, together, make everyone's life an adventure of responsibility.

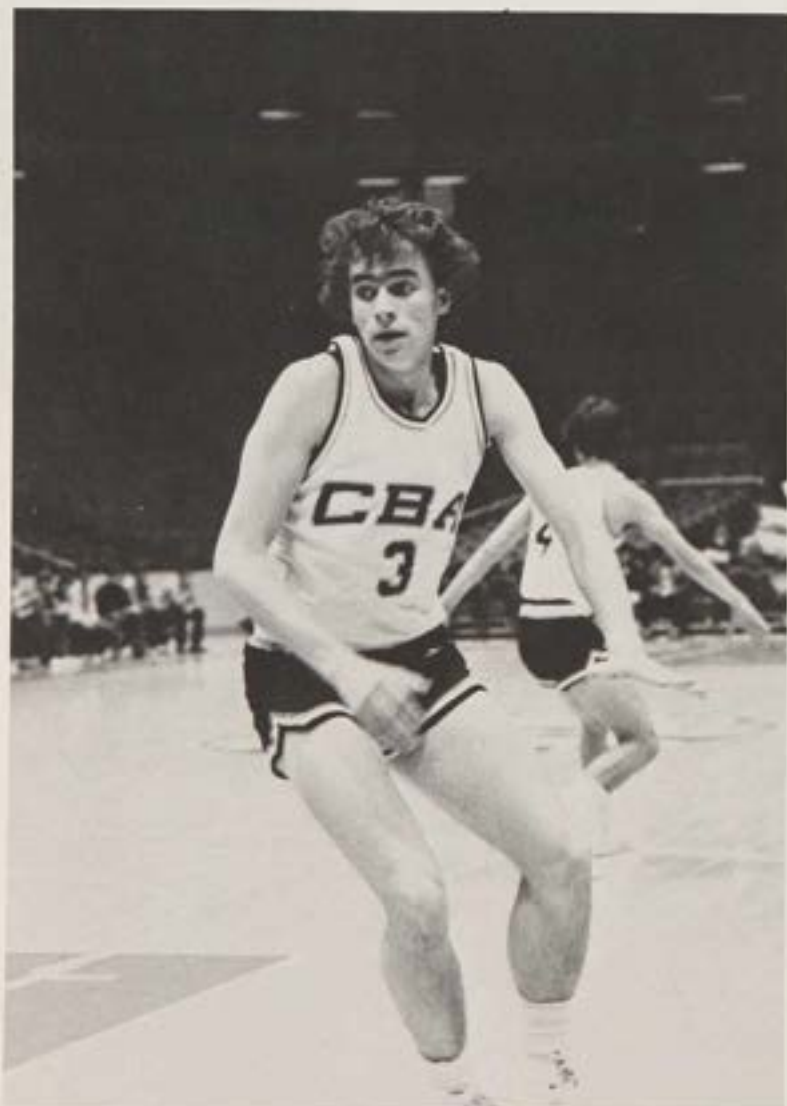

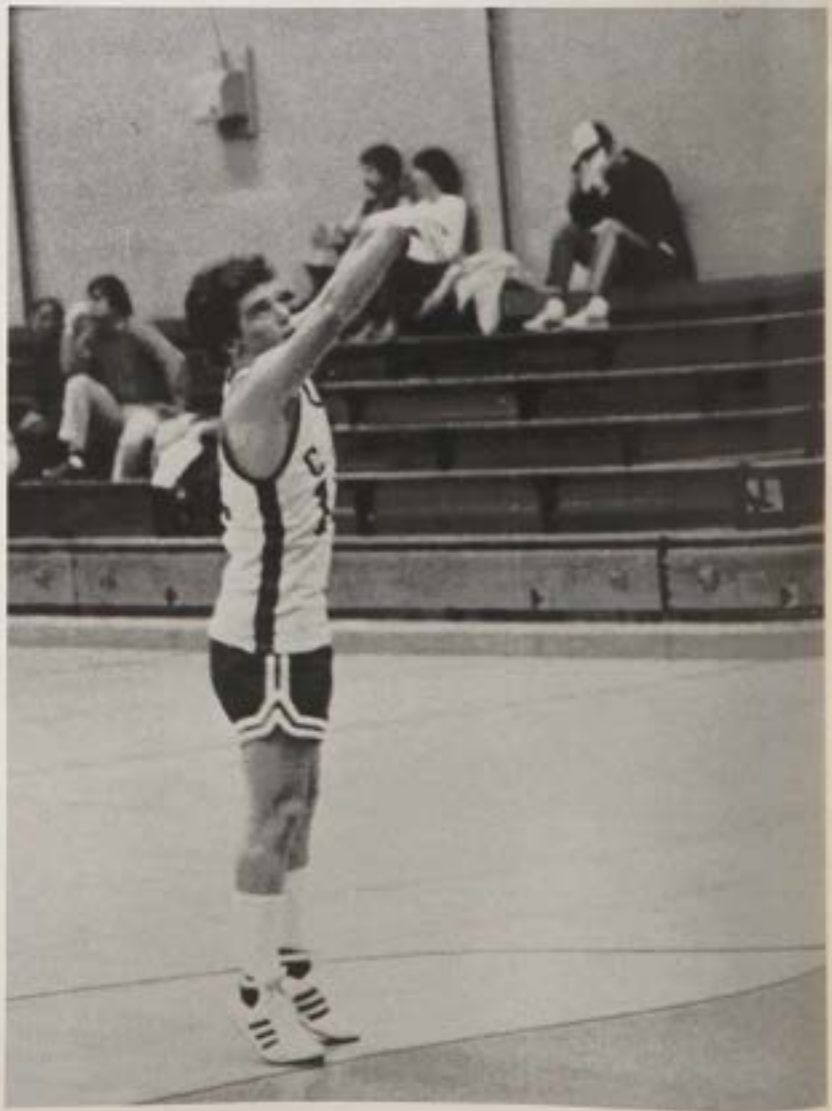

The individual half of the season was characterized by consistency. Both Forino and Cashman placed in the top six of nearly every meet they entered. Forino's best mark, 54'6 1/2", put him at fifth on the all time school

indoor list while Cashman's 52' personal best was eighth. The other two varsity letter winners, Jim Walter and Joe Scimeca were also consistent. Both competed well all season with Walter recording a toss of 48'11" and a first place finish at the Shore Novice Championships. Scimeca had a best of 46'6" but showed great promise on a number of long fouls.

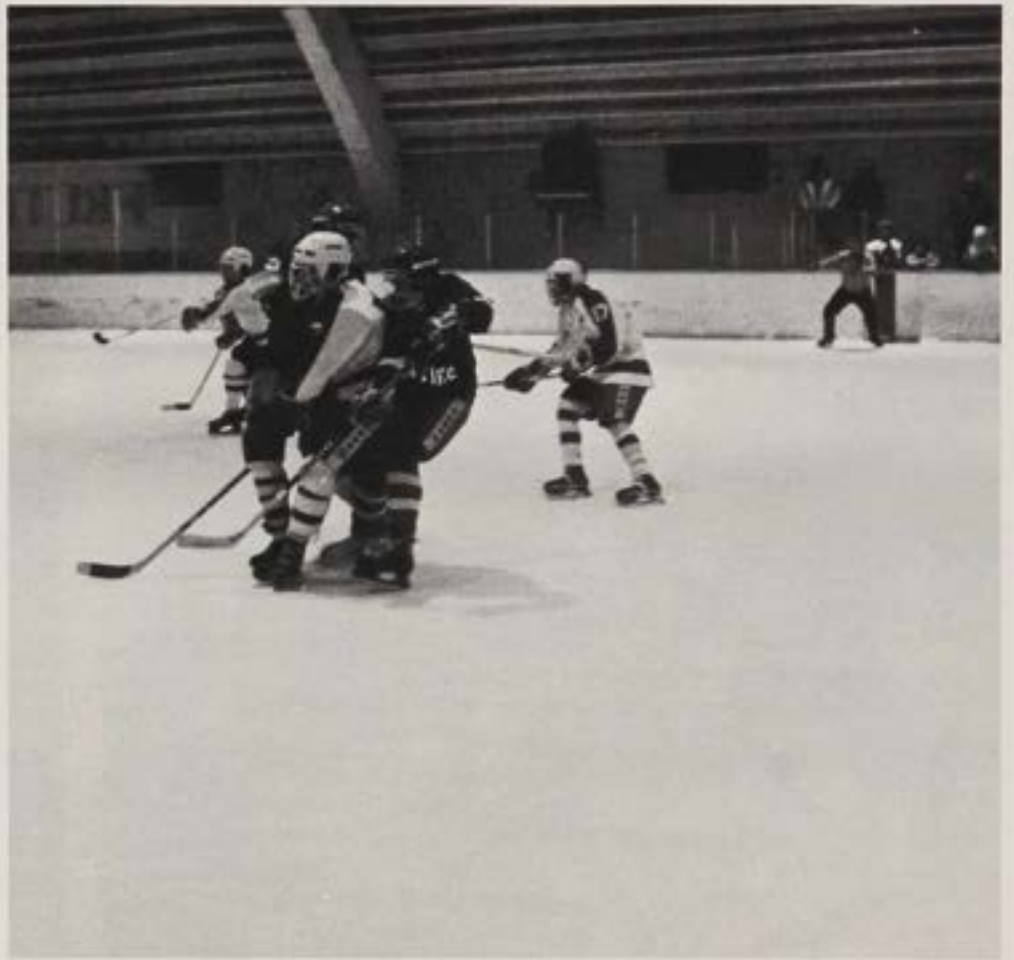

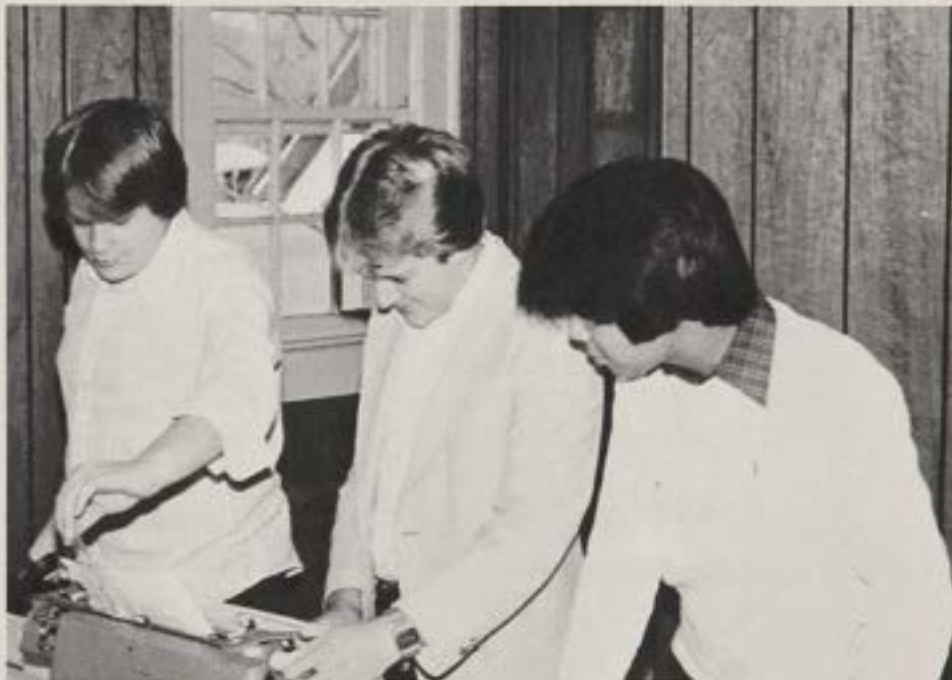

Campus Ministry

CAMPUS MINISTRY is an integral part of CBA's environment. The coordinator of CAMPUS MINISTRY is Miss Pat Tracey, who is in that position for the second straight year. CAMPUS MINISTRY is there for any student who wants to get involved with various religious and community affairs, but naturally, only a few leading students are involved. Jim Millonig was the first student coordinator. John Nanfeldt was in charge of two annual fund raisers; The Thanksgiving Food Drive, and the Christmas Toy Drive. A new development was the introduction of Social Concern Study groups. A Nuclear Disarmament group was formed this year under the direction of Mr. Koch, which is known by its acronym, LIBRA. Larry Sentanni formed a study group for World Hunger; and by himself, raised close to \$72. CAMPUS MINISTRY also includes the organization of most of our retreats, the liturgies, and penance services. They are organized by Miss Tracey, faculty, and students like John O'Connor and Rob Stefanski. CAMPUS MINISTRY also offers opportunities for public-relations and volunteer work at De la Salle Hall and the Hand-in-Hand Festival. The Campus Ministry is comprised of three areas of involvement in which all the students actively participate — Service, Social Concerns, and Spirituality.

In the future, CAMPUS MINISTRY wishes to develop further. We, as members, feel that the potential good of the concept is extremely exciting. In just two years, the students' individual interest in the CAMPUS MINISTRY has been overwhelming. The biggest challenge that is now seen is to organize and structure CAMPUS MINISTRY as a whole. This is an enormous job since CAMPUS MINISTRY stretches to all corners of the CBA community. We feel that in order to do this, the participants have to become a clearly organized society. A way for the active members to communicate with each other has to be improved and a definite structure of responsibilities needs to be assigned and clarified. Nevertheless, the second active year of CAMPUS MINISTRY has been an impressive and hopeful beginning. We, as a group made mistakes, but we learned from those errors in order to improve the effectiveness of Campus Ministry for the years to come.

Focus: Nuclear Disarmament

A new social concerns group was formed at CBA this year called "Leaders in Bilateral Reduction of Arms", otherwise known as LIBRA. The main concern of LIBRA is to research the nuclear weaponry. LIBRA finds the production and use of nuclear weapons to be morally offensive to Christian values, and thus will work to bring about a nuclear weapons freeze and reduction.

The idea of the group was initiated in May of 1982 by Miss Pat Tracey, and the group was begun by a small group of interested students under the direction of Mr. Garry Koch. The members of LIBRA often become involved in other larger groups outside of CBA.

In reviewing the facts about nuclear weapons, one must realize the incredible destructive power of the weapons. Both the U.S. and the U.S.S.R. now have the power to completely destroy the world many times over. In addition to this physical destructive power, the manufacture of these weapons also destroys the economy as we spend upwards of twenty billion dollars each year for nuclear weapons. Also, with the escalation of the arms race comes an increased risk of accidental or terrorist backed detonation.

It is clear that the abolishment of nuclear weapons would contribute to a much healthier economy, and a much safer world. We must call for a mutual, verifiable nuclear freeze between the U.S. and U.S.S.R. An important step in this fight against nuclear weapons was the passage of the Nuclear Freeze Referendum this Nov. 2nd in the state of New Jersey and many other states. With this victory in mind, LIBRA will work to inform others of the urgent need for nuclear disarmament.

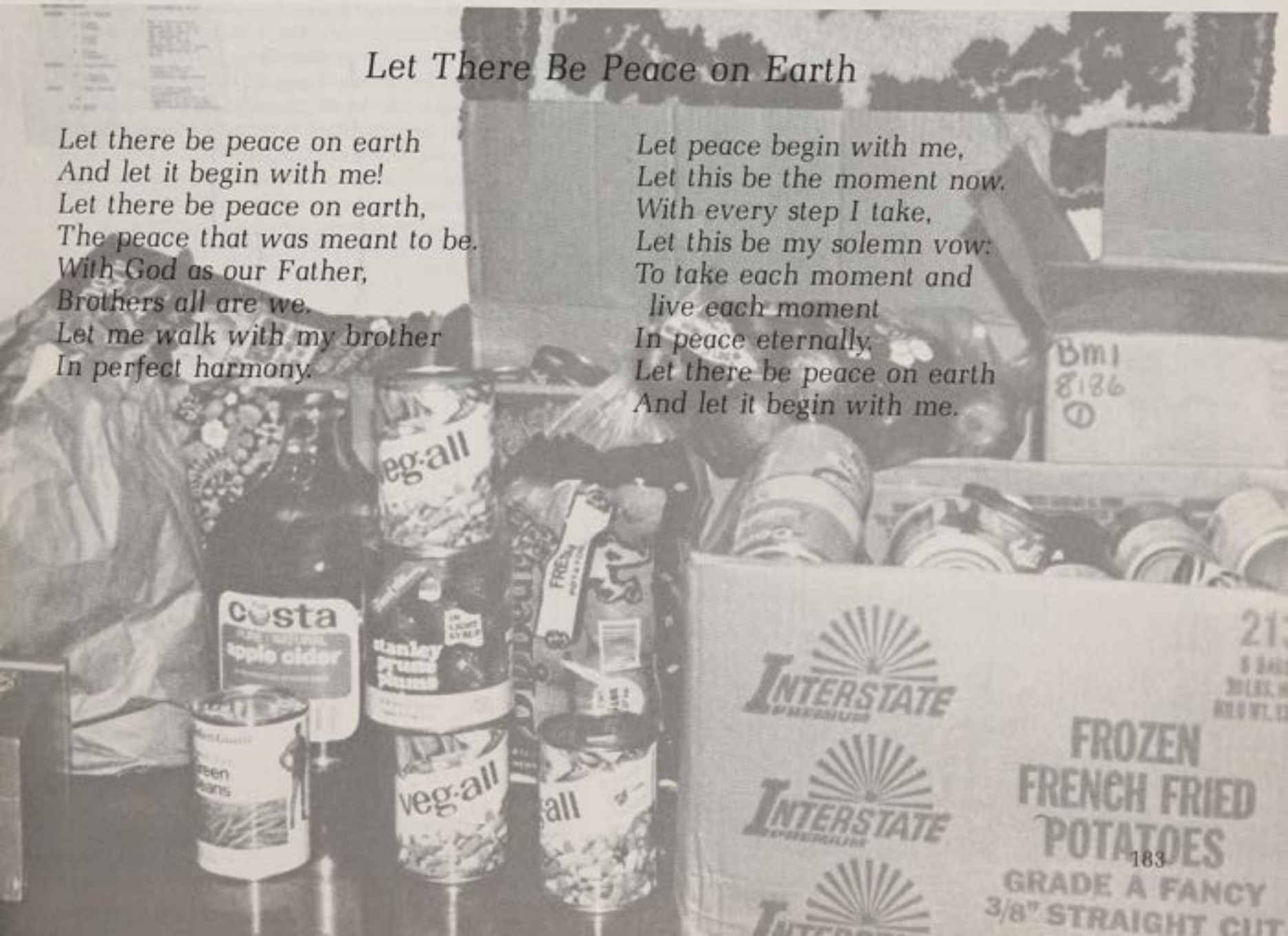

Guru Retreats

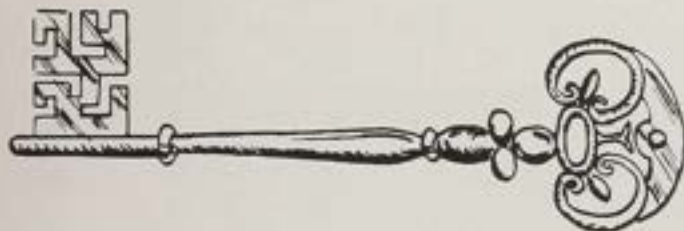

Focus: Play

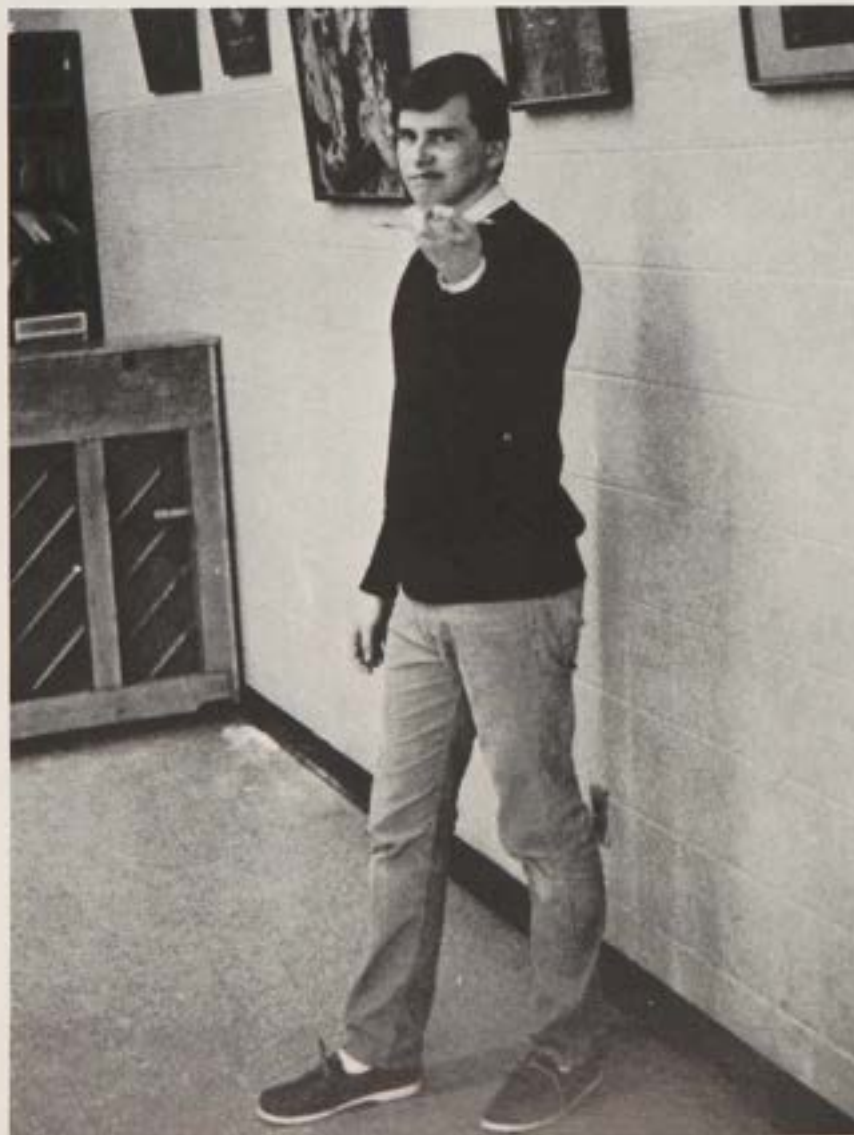

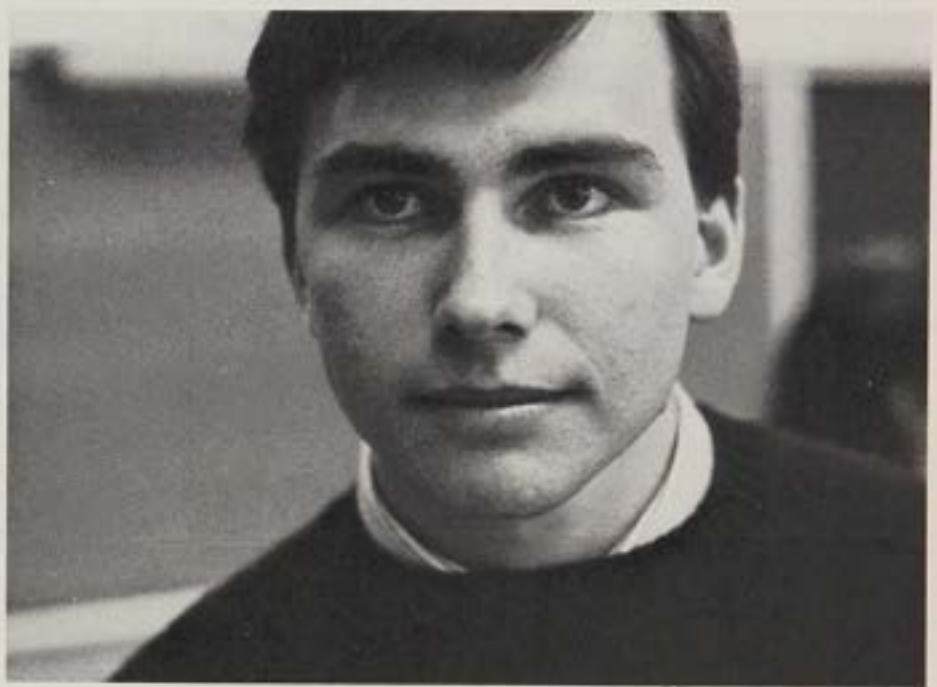

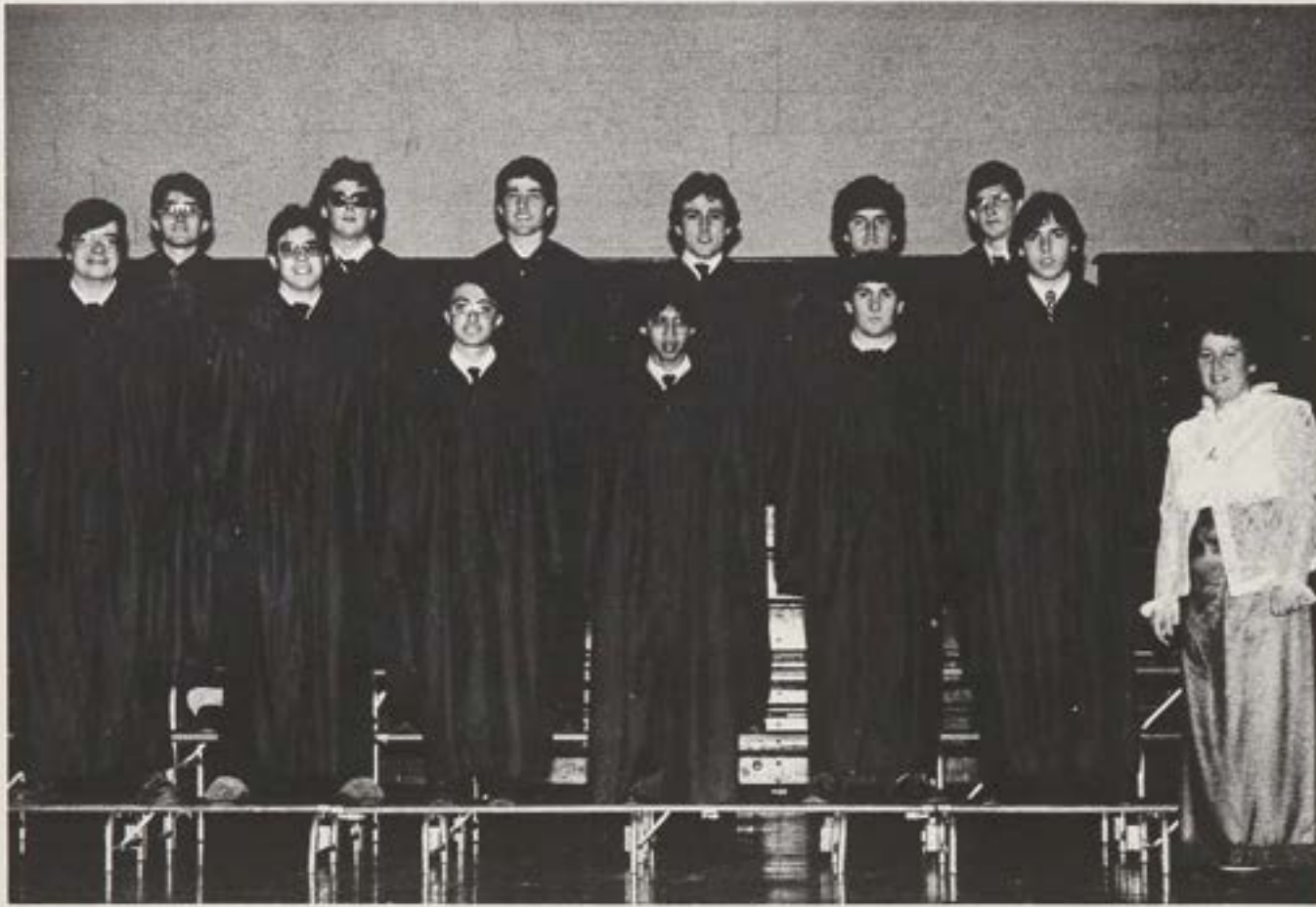

Focus: Junior A.P. Courses

CBA offers two Advanced Placement courses to juniors, Calculus I and American History. Both courses prepare the student for AP testing in May. The tests are scored on a rating from one to five; one being the lowest and five being the highest. In order to get college credit for the course, most colleges demand at least a three. At CBA, all Advanced Placement courses have a phase two weighting.

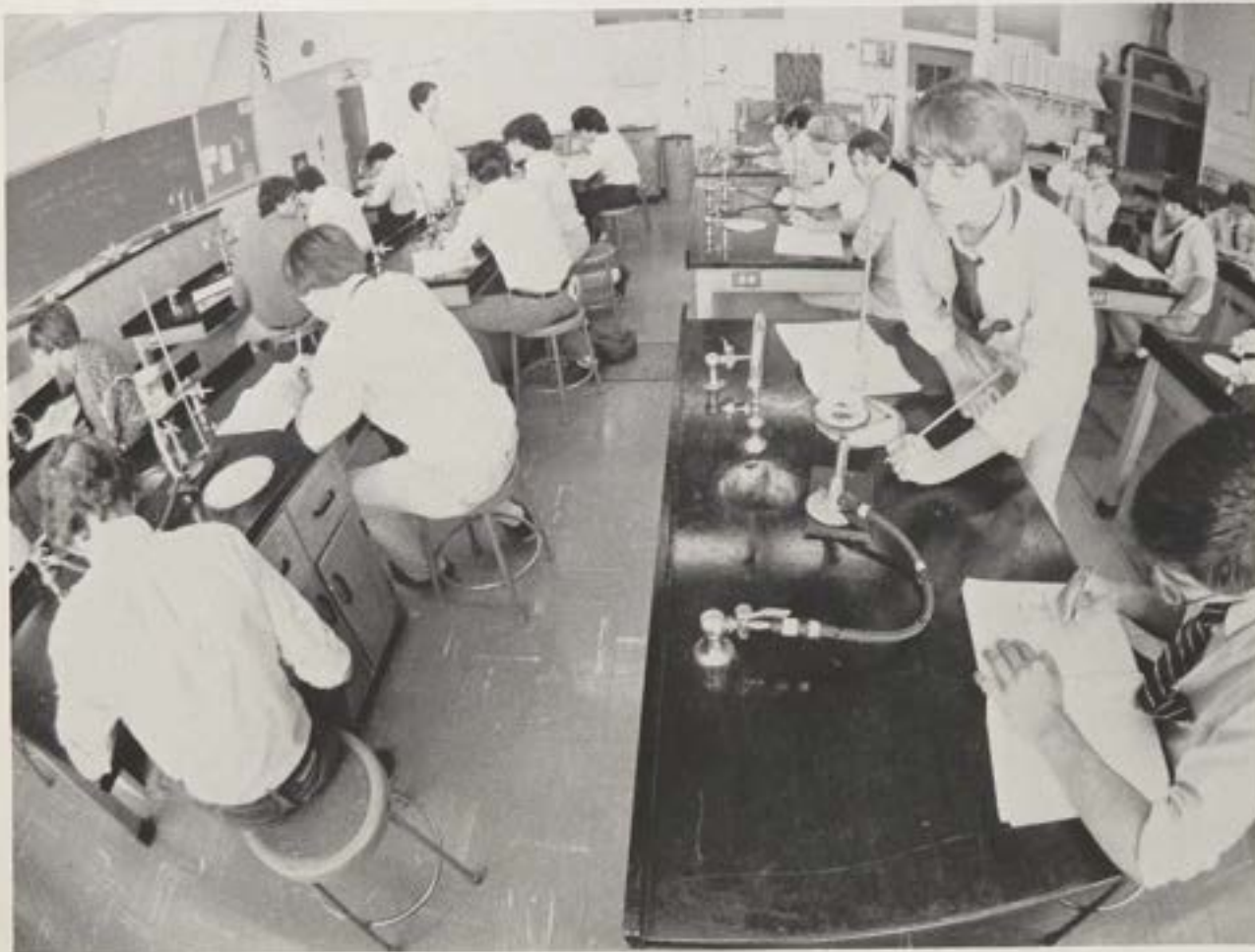
AP American History is taught by Mr. James Finnegan. Compared to the regular history course, AP History covers a broader and more comprehensive range of topics. The course

also includes a wide variety of outside readings and frequent essays on various topics specified by the teacher. At the end of the year to prepare the student for the Advanced Placement exam, an extensive review is conducted.

AP Calculus I is taught by Brother Christian Jones. The course is taught at a fast pace, and presents a challenge for all the students taking it. AP Calculus covers a greater range of topics than the regular math class. The course also prepares the student for the AP exam with a massive review at the end of the year.

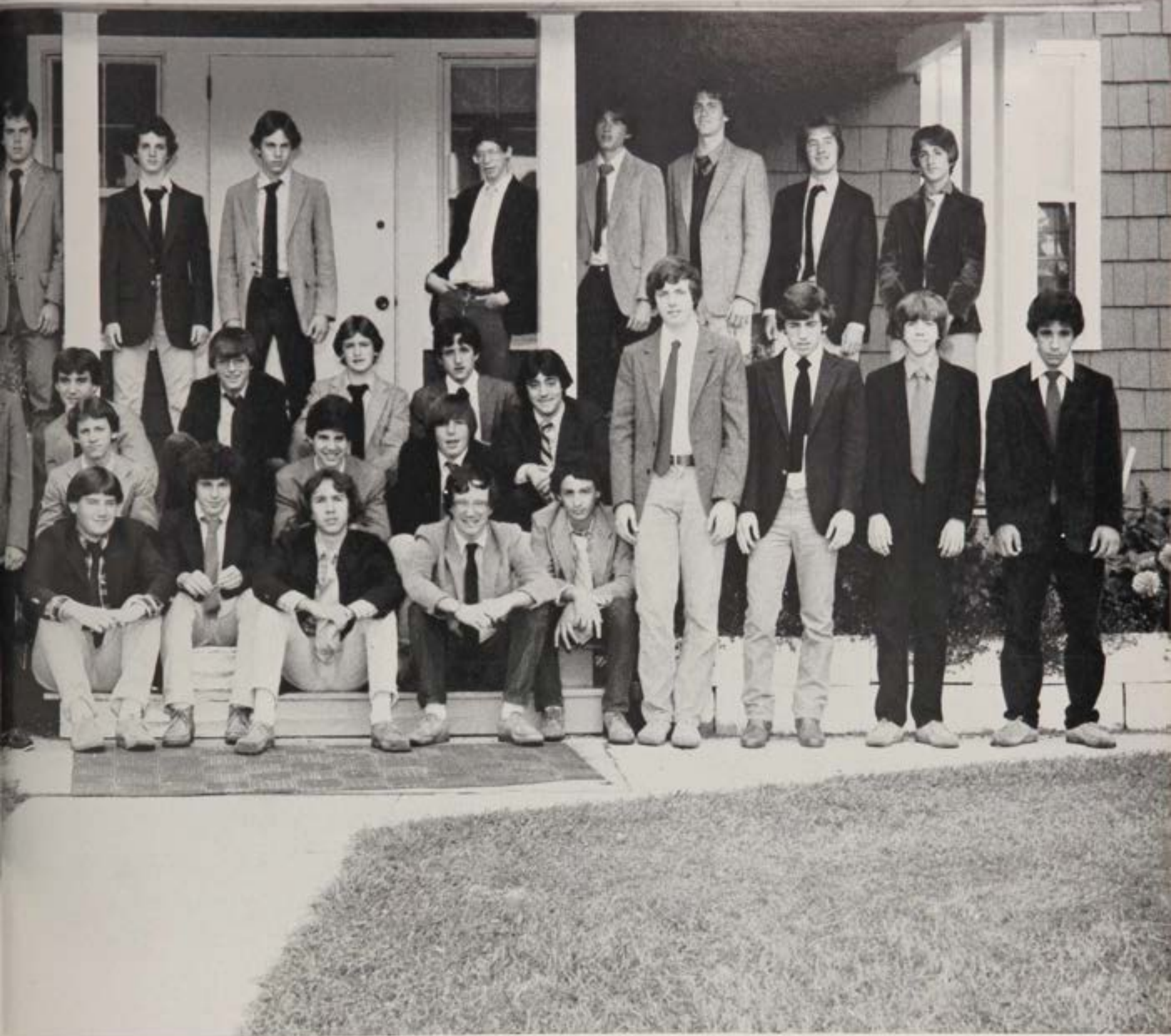

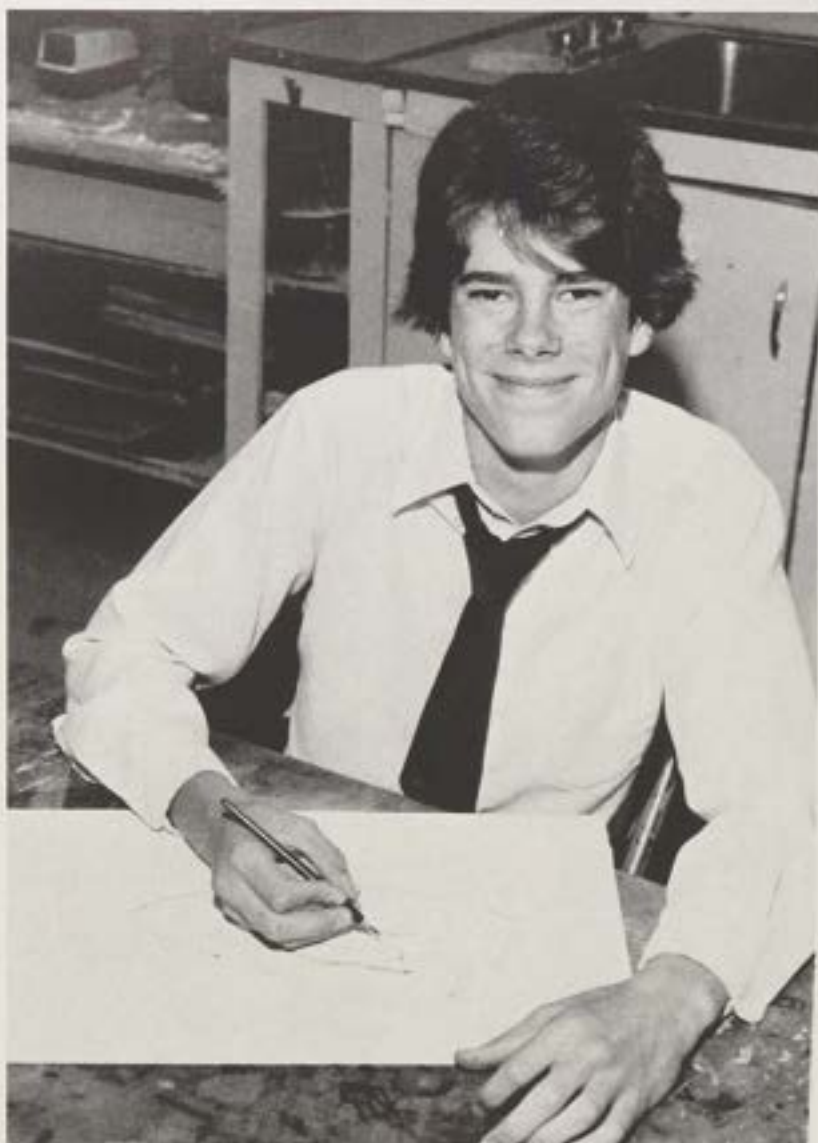
are also the select few who really enjoy the class and pass with flying colors.

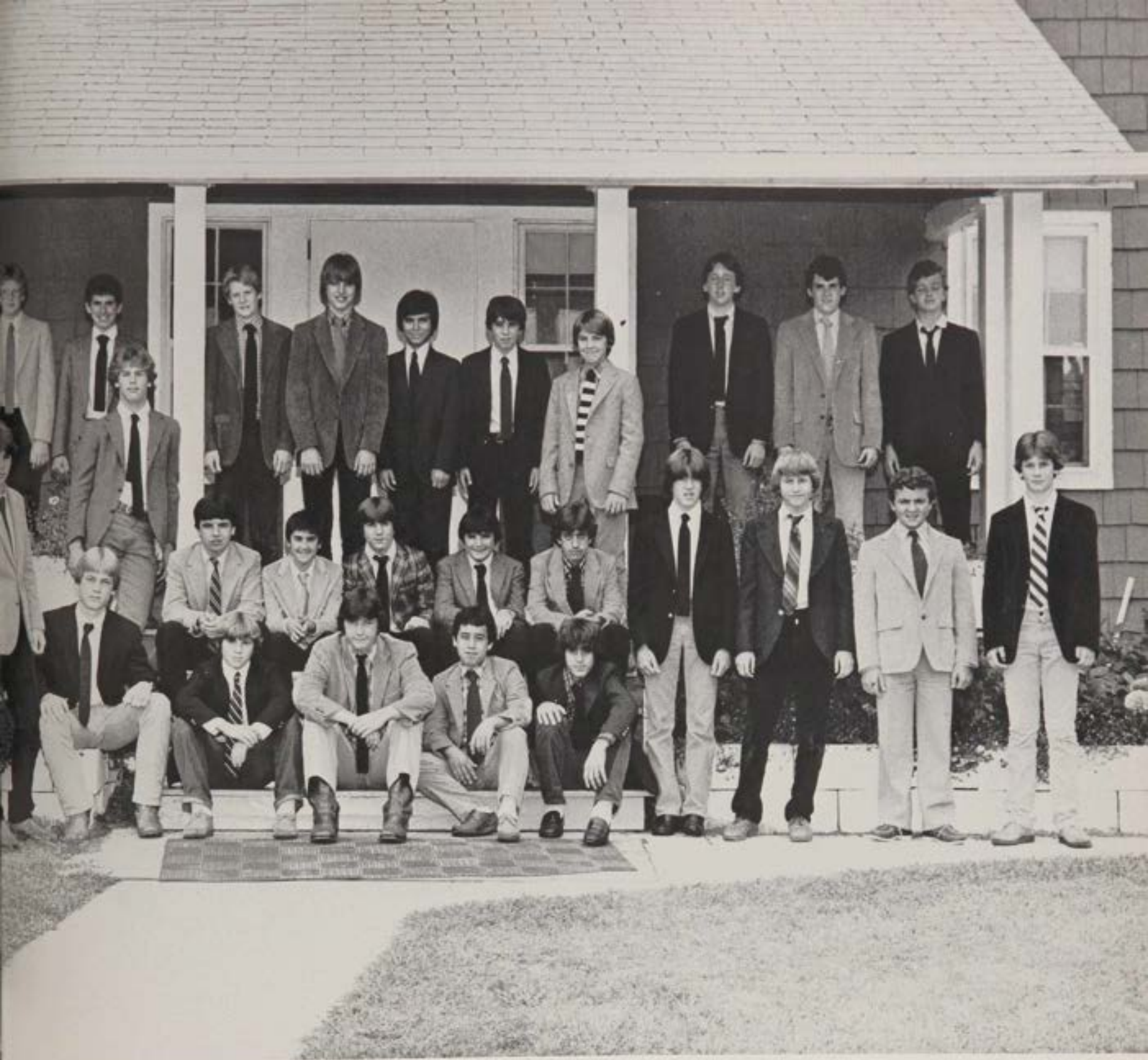

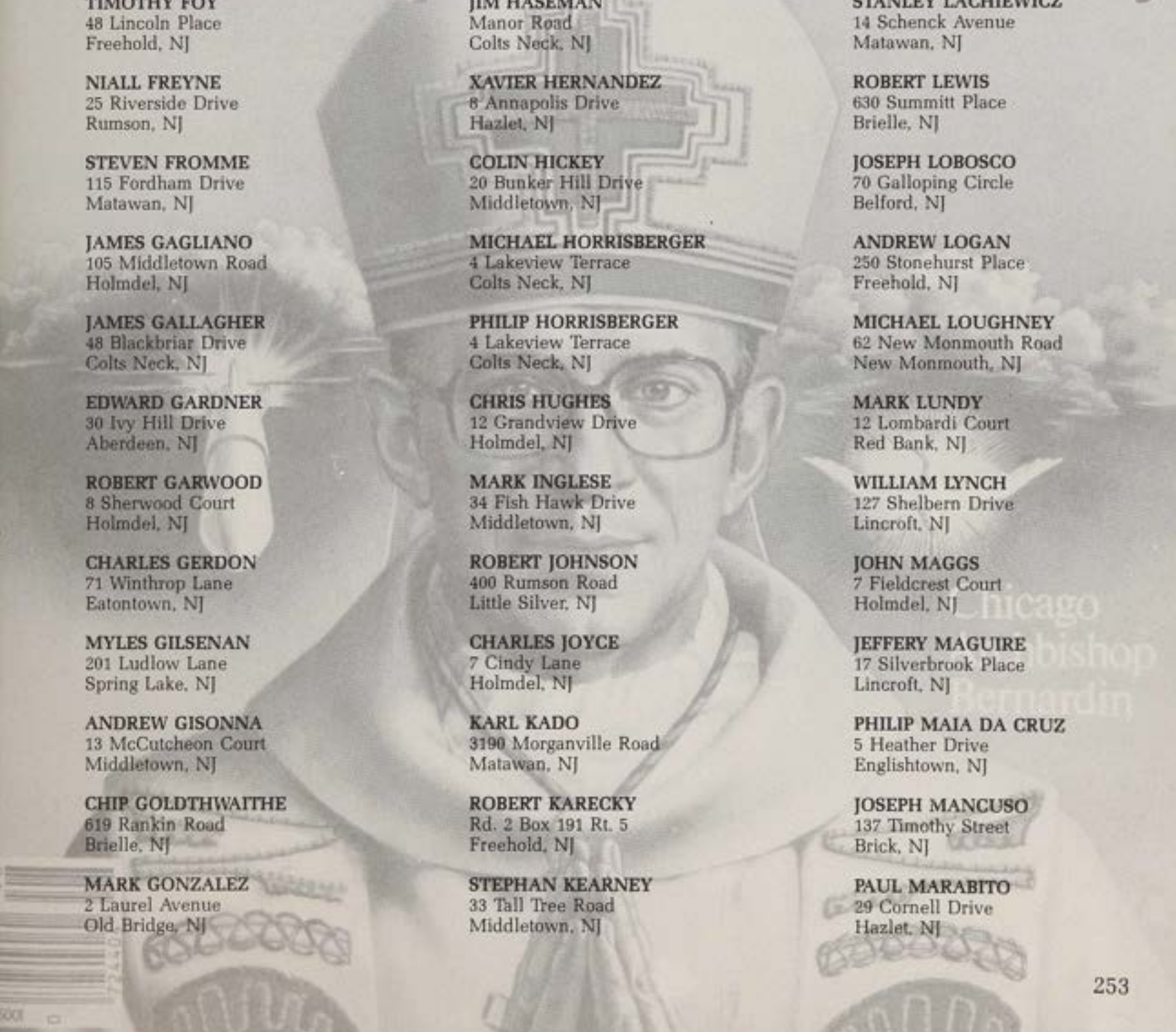

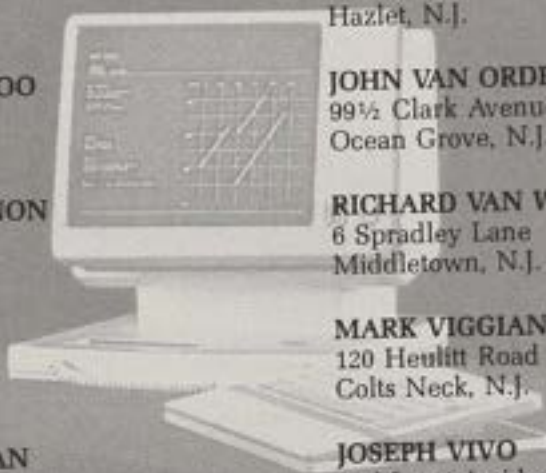
