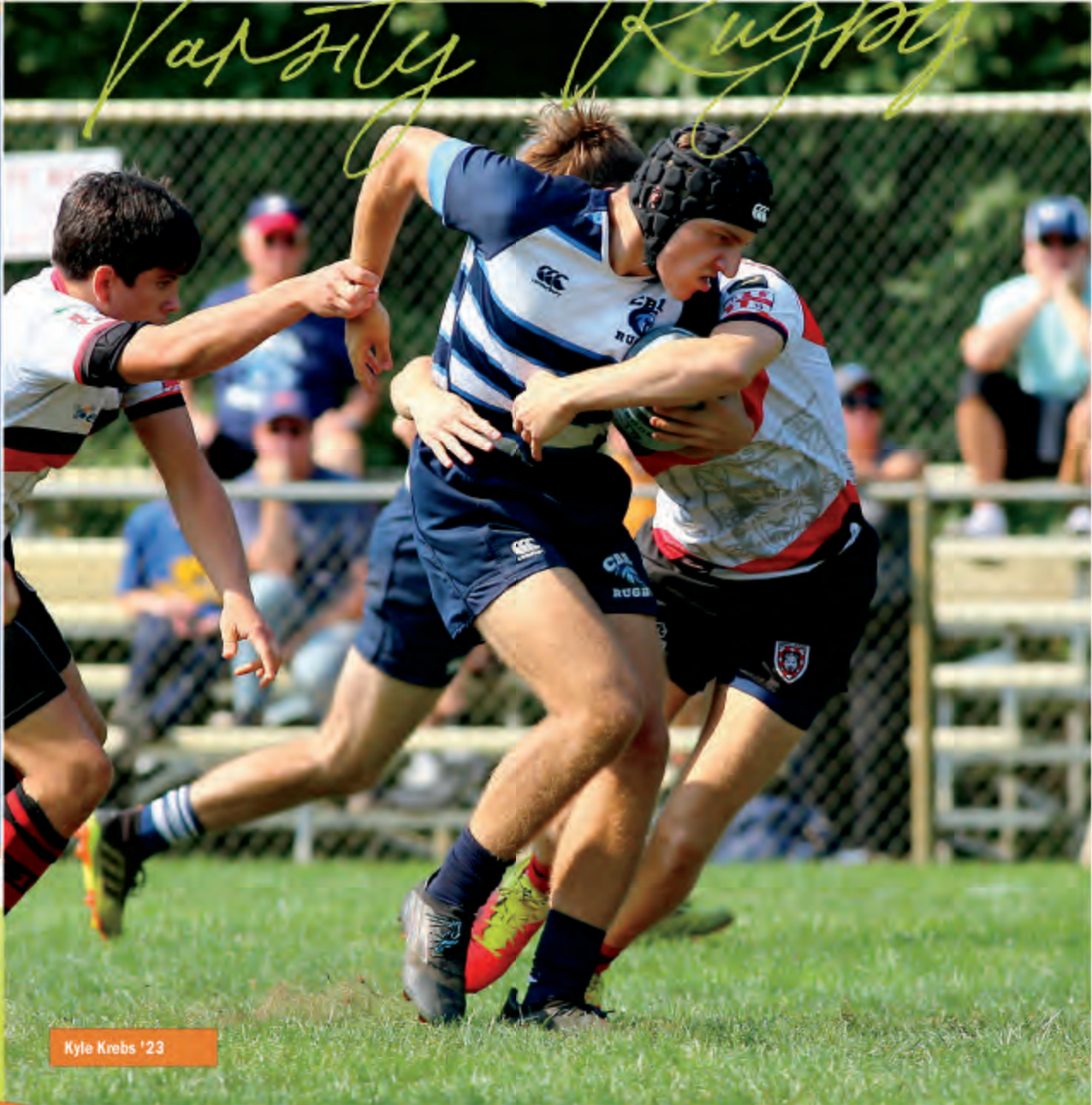

SEASON RECAP

The Colts started off the season with a tough 1-0 loss to Marlboro, but then turned their season around, closing out the regular season with a 12-game winning streak. The Colts then claimed the Shore Conference Tournament for the second year in a row with a 2-1 victory against Howell. The Colts earned the number 1 seed in NJ Non-Public South A with a 16-1 record. The Colts rolled through their opponents in the sectional tournament, taking on St. Peter's Prep in the Non-Public South A Sectional Final and winning 1-0 on a lone goal by Will Thygeson. This victory led the Colts back to the Non-Public A state final, where CBA met Seton Hall Prep again in a rematch of the 2021 state final. Thygeson gave the Colts a 1-0 lead again in the 77th minute, leading CBA to its 8th state championship. 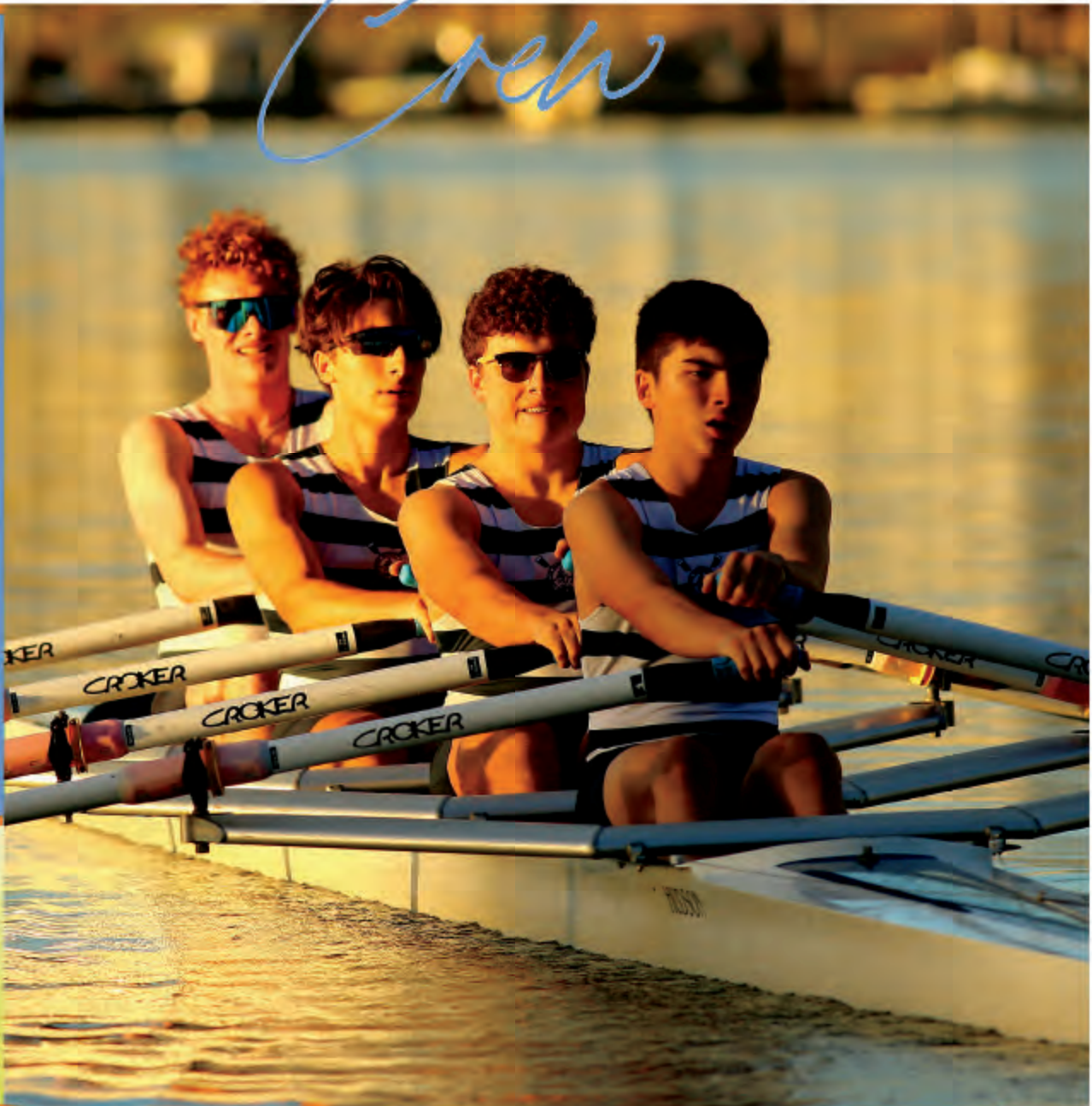

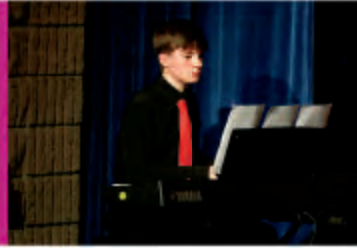

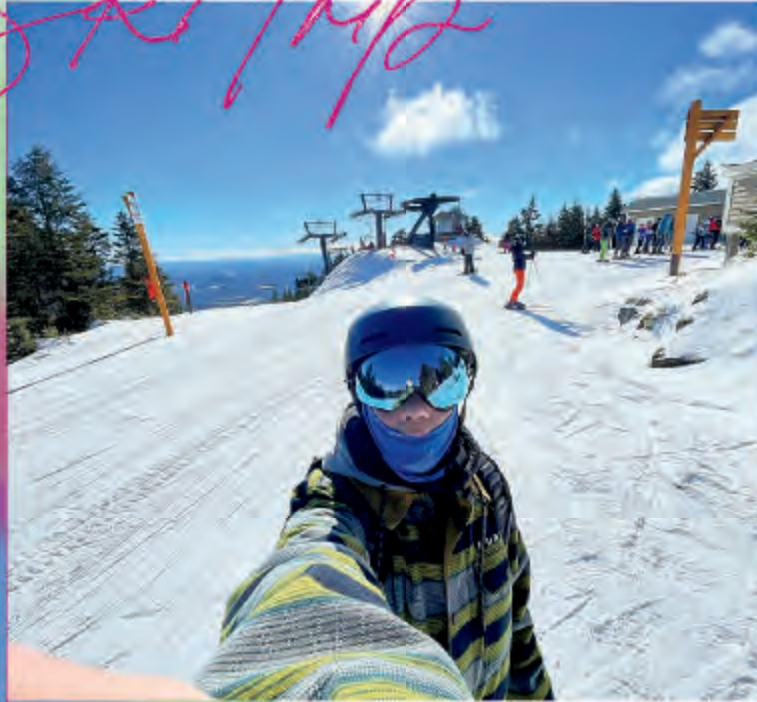

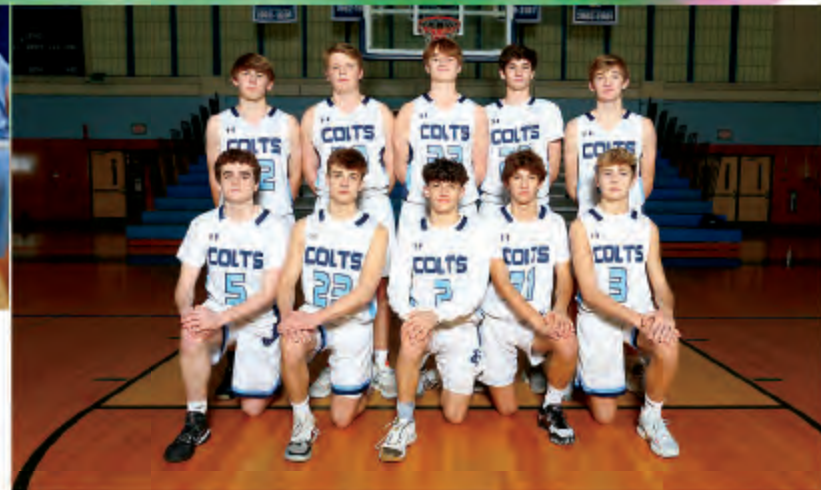

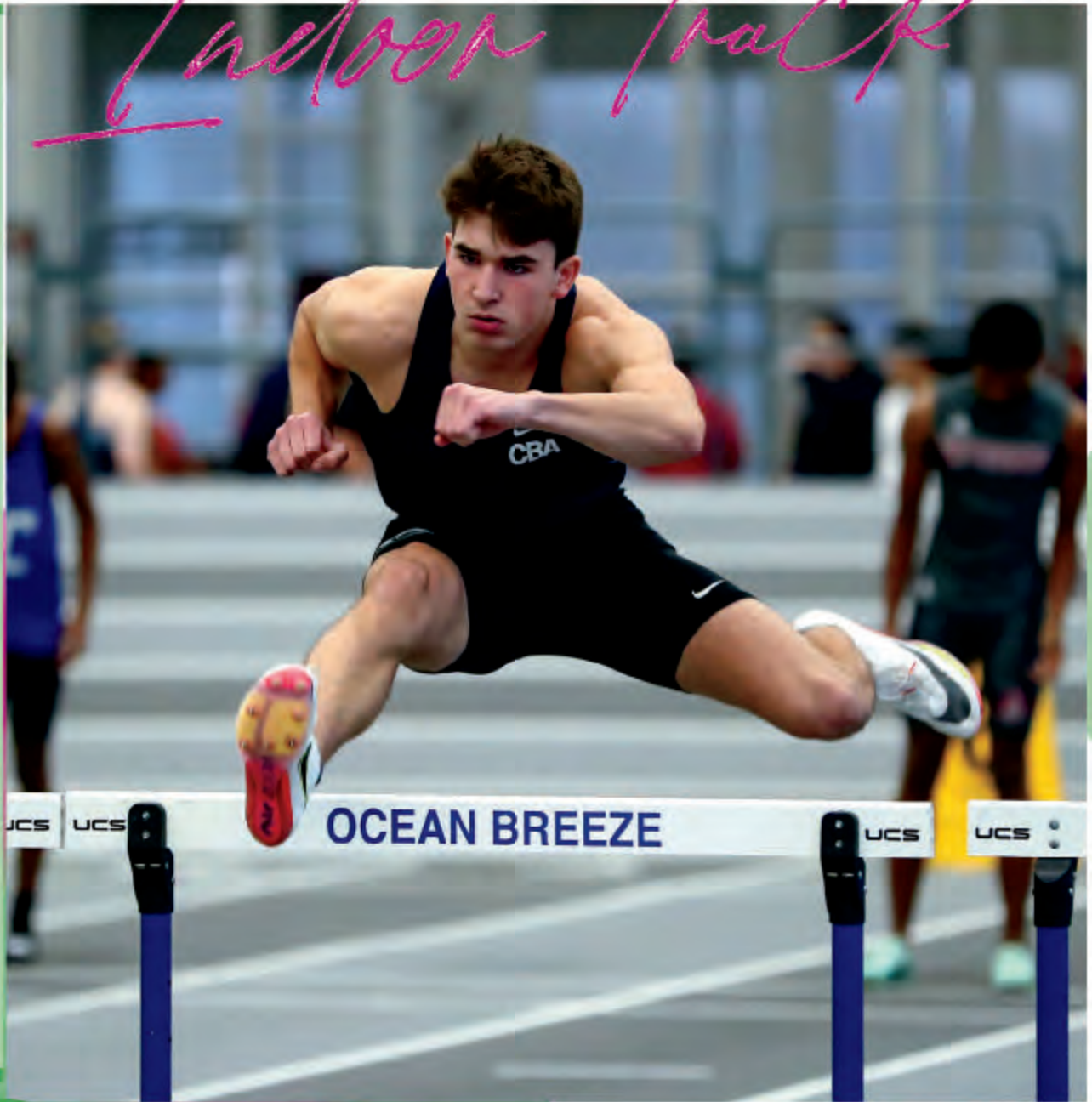

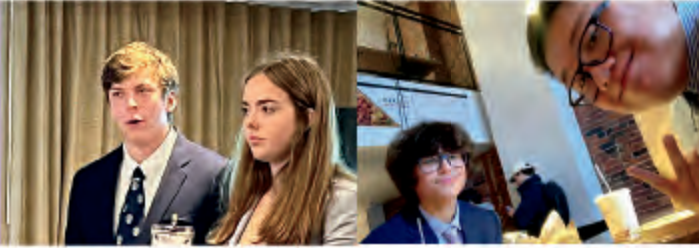

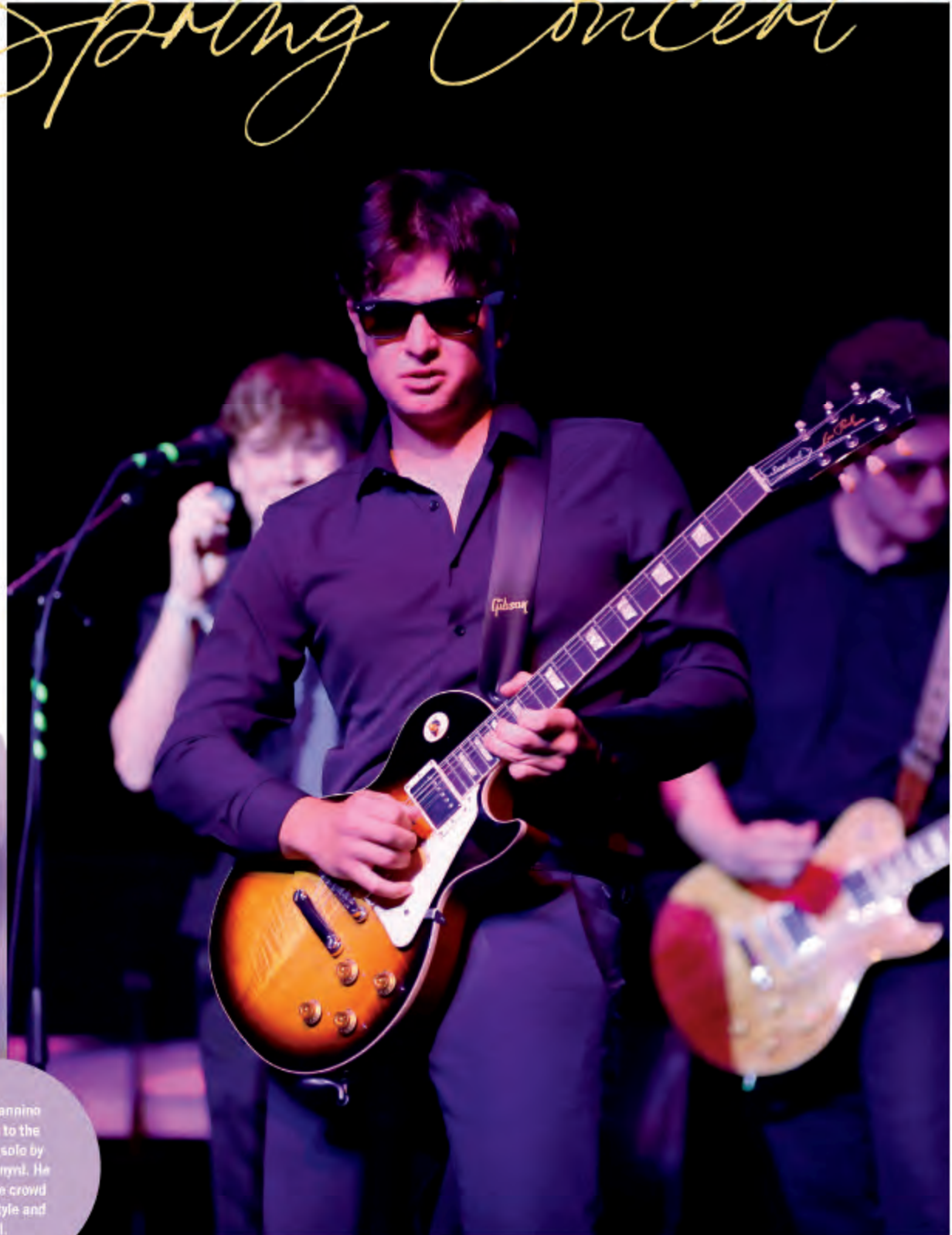

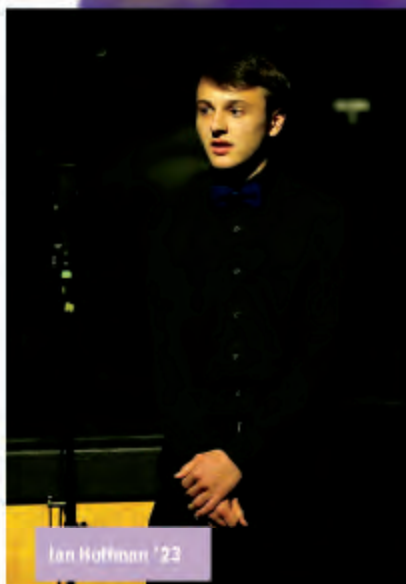

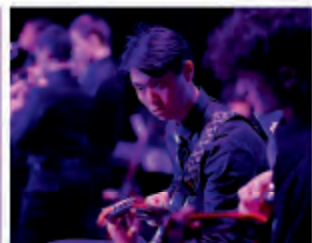

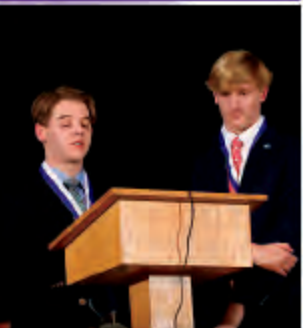

Osaka

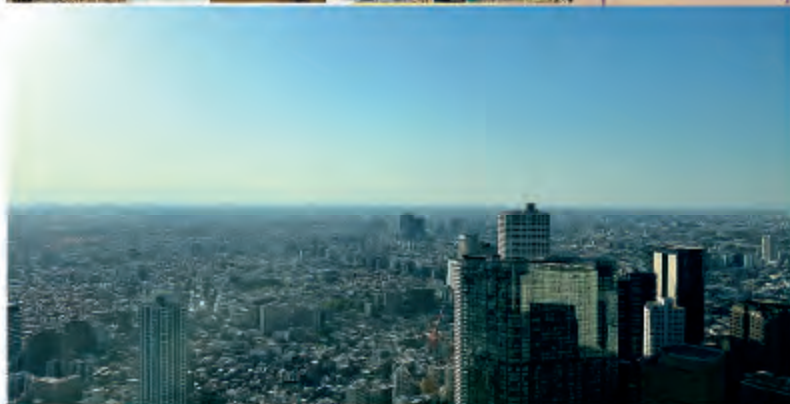

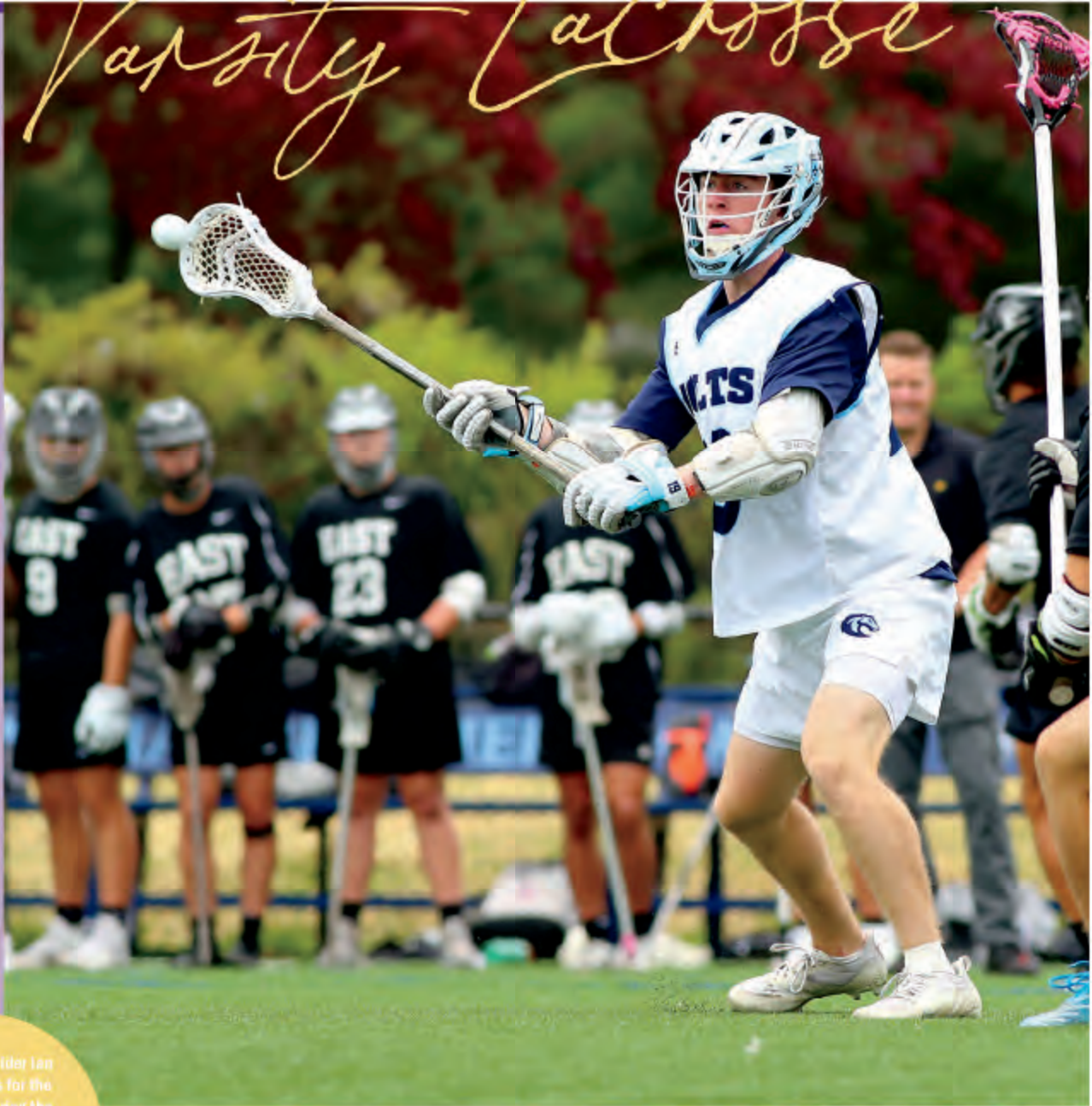

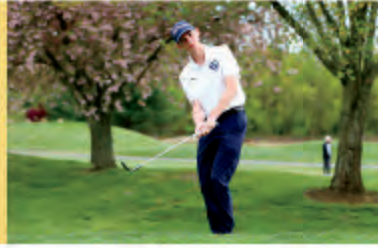

In the classroom, he is firm but fair. Everyone is treated equally. His students tell me he is a great teacher. He sets deadlines for assignments, and expects them to be met. The consequences are made clear well in advance if deadlines aren't met. No excuses. These are life skills all students need to be taught, and he does an excellent job instilling them.

Another life skill he provides his students is when he arranges for them to be mock-interviewed. Outside professionals come to CBA after school and interview the students for a mock job. This opportunity allows the students to learn how to dress for an interview and get real world experience in the job interviewing process.

In addition to teaching, I've had the opportunity to observe this year's recipient from a coaching perspective. He treats his athletes with respect and will accept nothing less from them in return. He compliments them when they do something right, and positively corrects them when they do something wrong. He doesn't yell and scream. He calmly explains what went wrong and how to fix it. When coaching during a game, he is calm, cool, collected, a professional. He is an excellent model of what good sportsmanship should look like. Win, lose, or draw, he reminds his athletes to shake hands and be respectful."

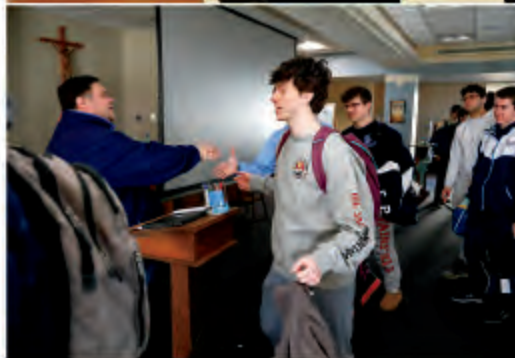
